ELIGIBILITY ages 6 to 15

Whether a child is home-schooled, attends a Medina County school district, or receives educational services at Windfall School, the Medina County Board of Developmental Disabilities (MCBDD) is proud to promote opportunties and empower families as they make choices for their child's future.

How does a child receive MCBDD services?

Guidelines for eligibility are set by the Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities (DODD). Generally speaking, 6 to 15 year old children are eligible for MCBDD services if they provide documented evidence of a qualifying diagnosis of a developmental disability and show at least **three** areas of substantial limitations on the statewide assessment. Our Eligibility Specialists will assist with this process.

Who is eligible?

A child must go through an eligibility process to be considered for MCBDD services. Our Eligibility Specialists will help you through this process, answer any questions, and help you complete the needed forms. An Eligibility Specialist may be contacted at 330-725-7751, option 2.

When will you know if a child is eligible?

Once all forms and the assessment are completed and reviewed, you will receive a letter - within 45 days letting you know if your child is eligible for MCBDD services.

If you receive a letter that your child is NOT eligible for MCBDD services, we will recommend other possible help and support for you. You may also appeal your eligibility decision. An Eligibility Specialist will provide you with information on how to use the appeal process.

Keep in mind, the state requires eligibility to be redetermined at age 6 and 15, but it may occur at any time to make sure your child continues to receive the support he/she needs. If found eligible, MCBDD Service and Support Administration (SSA) staff will work with families to identify, find, and connect individuals to community resources and services as needed. These may include the following:

Social/Recreation Programs - opportunities to develop social skills and particpate in activities within the community.

Family Support Services (FSS) - limited financial support, based on income, to help families care for their family member with disabilities at home.

Therapies - help in finding needed physical, occupational and speech therapies for children.

Assistive Technology - devices used to increase, maintain, or improve the functional capabilities of a child with a disability.

Your Service and Support Administrator will also work with your local school district to support you through the Individualized Education Plan (IEP) process, and help you address living skills, transition planning, health and behavorial concerns.
