

MEDINA COUNTY BOARD OF DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES Regular Board Meeting Minutes February 27, 2023

I. <u>Call to Order</u>

The MCBDD Regular Board Meeting was called to order by Board President Wayne Carroll at 5:05 p.m. Other Board Members present included the following: Dave Hartman, Andy Olah, Ann Salek, Sandra Thomas Fain, and Lisa Dreaden. Mark Gryskiewicz was excused.

Staff present included the following: Stacey Maleckar, Annie Finnerty, Shannon Lees, Diana Davis, Bobby Richards, Patti Hetkey, Sabrina Johnson, Carey Bates, Ed Dryer, Celeste Bajorek, and Pam Hunt.

Others present included the following: Keisha Thomas.

II. <u>General Session</u>

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

B. Mission Statement Affirmation

The Mission Statement was recited.

C. Approval of Minutes

1. Approval of the Minutes from the Nominating Committee Meeting, January 23, 2023

A Motion was made by Mr. Hartman, seconded by Mr. Olah, to approve the Minutes from the Nominating Committee Meeting on January 23, 2023. There was no discussion. The Motion was approved with a unanimous "yes" vote.

2. Approval of the Minutes from the Annual Organizational Meeting, January 23, 2023

A Motion was made by Ms. Thomas Fain, seconded by Ms. Dreaden, to approve the Minutes from the Annual Organizational Meeting on January 23, 2023. There was no discussion. The Motion was approved with a unanimous "yes" vote.

3. Approval of the Minutes from the Regular Board Meeting, January 23, 2023 A Motion was made by Ms. Thomas Fain, seconded by Mr. Olah, to approve the Minutes from the Regular Board Meeting on January 23, 2023. There was no discussion. The Motion was approved with a unanimous "yes" vote.

D. Presentation

Ms. Maleckar distributed a fact sheet regarding the DSP Crisis. The following was shared with the Board:

- Statistics regarding the impact of low rates
- What we can and cannot do in regard to assisting with rates
- How to advocate for rate increase to legislators

Page 1 of 5 Regular Board Meeting February 27, 2023 • Governor's DeWine's budget proposal includes a 16.5% rate increase for HPC/On-Site-On-Call/Shared Living/Respite/Behavior/Medical/Complex Care & Competency-Based add ons and a 10% rate increase for ADS/Voc Hab/Employment Supports-Career Planning/NMT.

Ms. Maleckar presented a Resolution to the Board for signature. The Resolution states that the Medina County Board of DD recognizes that people with developmental disabilities cannot get the care they need due to the workforce crisis, caused by low wages. It states that the Board formally requests State of Ohio Legislators to protect the health and safety of people with developmental disabilities by supporting a historic investment in service reimbursement, allowing providers to recruit and retain quality DSPs. Mr. Olah made a Motion to accept the Resolution, Mr. Hartman seconded the Motion. Mr. Hartman stated we need to push the state to think outside the box with this DSP crisis. Mr. Olah stated that DSPs do not have incentive to stay on with no advancement opportunities. He stated the program needs re-structured to establish incentives. Ms. Thomas Fain stated that DSPs with additional certification, such as Med Pass, should be paid more. Ms. Dreaden stated that at this time, the most important action we can take is awareness. All Board Members signed the Resolution. Ms. Lees stated this is not an official agency Resolution, and Mr. Olah withdrew his Motion.

Ms. Maleckar also stated that in addition to the Resolution, March 1 is Advocacy Day and there will be activities at the MCAC from 9:30am-12pm. There are about 45 participants so far who will be attending and watching the livestream of the event taking place at the State House. Board Members are welcome to attend. There is also a Legislative Breakfast on March 13; several legislators have been invited. Ms. Maleckar stated it would be great to have at least one or two Board Members present.

E. Discussion Items

1. Board Member Self Evaluations

Mr. Carroll reviewed the results of the 2022 Annual Board Member Self Evaluations. There were two areas that he feels need addressed. They are the Board's understanding of legal requirements and the Board's understanding of Board Programs and Services. He requested that Ms. Maleckar provide some additional training in these areas for the Board. Ms. Salek stated that due to the volume of information and the fact that it is always changing, she is not confident that the Board will every fully understand the entire legal aspect. Ms. Maleckar stated that the Board does not necessarily have to understand all of the legalities, as we are able to consult with the Prosecutor's Office for any legal issues or questions. Mr. Carroll stated that overall, the results of the Self Evaluations were positive.

G. New Business

1. Ohio Schools Council Resolution #05-23

A Motion was made by Ms. Salek, seconded by Ms. Thomas Fain, to approve Resolution #05-23 to grant the Superintendent of the Medina County Board of Developmental Disabilities the authority to modify, amend, or supplement Ohio Schools Council Policy 1.1 Section 10 Agreement, Policy 1.3 Section 11 Bylaws, and any other Agreements requiring Ohio Schools Page 2 of 5 Regular Board Meeting February 27, 2023

Council Assembly approval. These modifications, amendments and supplements may occur at any regular or special meeting of the Ohio Schools Assembly at which a quorum is present. Approval of a modification, amendment or supplement requires a simple majority vote of the quorum. Ms. Bates stated that this resolution simply gives the Superintendents authority to approve policy changes to the Ohio Schools Council Governance Policy, rather than having to take it to the Board. She stated that Ohio Schools Council is one option we can use for purchasing, but is not required. The Motion was approved with a unanimous "yes" vote.

2. Revision to 2023 Board Meeting Calendar Resolution #06-23

A Motion was made by Ms. Salek, seconded by Ms. Dreaden, to approve the following revision to the current 2023 Board Meeting Calendar: The Ethics Committee Meeting will be moved from April 24, 2023 to May 15, 2023. In the future, the calendar will state that some meeting dates may change in order to avoid having to take these types of changes back to the Board for approval. The Motion was approved with a unanimous "yes" vote.

3. PERS Pick Up for Superintendent Resolution #07-23

A Motion was made by Mr. Olah, seconded by Ms. Salek, to approve Resolution #07-23 for the Medina County Board of DD to pick up the statutorily required contribution to the Ohio Public Employees Retirement System for the Superintendent of the Medina County Board of DD. Mr. Carroll stated that this was already approved at the last Board Meeting; however, the Director of HR informed Mr. Carroll that specific language needs to be used on this type of Resolution. Mr. Hartman asked if this Resolution is replacing a previous one. Ms. Lees stated that the previous Resolution included the salary increase along with the PERS pick up. Ms. Davis stated that this Resolution is simply clearing up the language. The Motion was approved with a unanimous "yes" vote.



14 SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT March 2023

<u>SSA</u>

- The SSA Department has welcomed Lisa Sopko as our newest SSA. This addition has all positions in the department filled and a total count of 29 SSAs. She has completed her training, started creating relationships, and is working towards building up her caseload.
- We have successfully started submitting the new Ohio ISPs electronically through Brittco's software system. The SSA management team will continue to host lunch & learns to provide additional trainings and supports through this transition.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

- March is Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month 3/1 was promoted countywide as "Wear Blue for Inclusion." The Wadsworth Chamber of Commerce display window for March features the MCBDD and people with developmental disabilities. Articles were in local news and social media.
- We held an Advocacy Day on Wednesday, 3/1, at the Achievement Center. Attendees were able to watch the livestream of activities in Columbus, as well as take part in advocacy activities centered around the DSP workforce crisis.
- We attended the St. Ambrose Health Fair on Sunday, 3/12, to promote Early Intervention and developmental milestones.
- We held a DD Discussions: Legislative Breakfast on Friday, 3/17, for state and local officials to learn about the impact of the current DSP crisis. Several providers, DSPs, and families joined the panel discussion to tell their stories and ask for help from state legislators.
- We attended the Hinckley Buzzard Buzz event on Saturday, 3/18, to promote general agency awareness.
- We promoted the 2023 MCBDD Camperships which help with some costs associated with individuals attending summer camps and the Leadership Academy for individuals interested in expanding their advocacy efforts into leadership roles in our community.
- The MCBDD Donor Scholarship application deadline is Friday, 3/31. All local school districts have been provided with information to pass along to their students. This year's scholarship amount is \$1,500.00.





Highlights and Concerns

- 1. MCBDD is collaborating with the Medina County Career Center (MCCC) and the Ohio Alliance of DSP's (OADSP) to implement a DSP curriculum into a current education program at MCCC.
- The Recruitment Advisory Group has met twice and the initial recommendation is to find new applicant pools by partnering with local schools to build awareness. SSA Mingles are scheduled for the year - the first was in March and 37 people attended.
- 3. Surveys are being sent out to address specific needs for frontline supervisor trainings as well as improvements to the MCBDD provider website. The OADSP curriculum does include front line supervisor training and we will look at that as a resource for training.
- 4. All providers certified in Career Planning have been contacted. A training and process are being developed by the Employment Navigator to train six interested providers in the Discovery process.



Do You Use "People First Language?"

From: The Medina County Board of Developmental Disabilities

Do the words used to describe you have an impact on your life? You bet! Contrary to the age-old "sticks and stones" lesson we learned as children, words do matter. They can raise or lower expectations; hurt or help; and so much more. Did you know that the first way to devalue someone with a disability is through language; by using words or labels to identify a person as "less-than," or not like us. Using People First Language putting the person before the disability - will help to eliminate old and hurtful descriptions and move us in a new and more inclusive direction.

People First Language is not political correctness; instead, it demonstrates good manners and respect. It can change the way we see a person, and it can change the way a person sees them self. People with different abilities are not their diagnoses or disabilities; they are people first.

Avoid putting a label or condition prior to a person's name or title. Examples: "John is a person with autism", not "John is autistic." Or "The meeting was for students with different abilities", not "The disabled student's meeting."

■ Only refer to a person's disability when it is relevant to the conversation. Examples: "Jenny has fibromyalgia, a condition that causes symptoms like muscle spasms and fatigue," not "Jenny constantly twitches."

Avoid negative or sensational descriptions of a person's disability, keep it positive. Examples: "Jim suffers every moment of the day because of his severe epilepsy," rather say "Jim, a person living with epilepsy, also enjoys going out."

■ Don't portray people with disabilities as overly courageous, brave, special, or super human. Example: "Autistic children are special and bravely face enormous challenges each day." instead try "Children with autism spends their days working on increasing their abilities."



Here is a list of common phrases and terms that are useful when using person-first language, as well as some terms and phrases to avoid.

WORDS THAT WORK

- individual with a different ability
- individual who has autism
- student with learning challenges
- person who is visually impaired
- relative who is hearing impaired
- people who use wheelchairs

AVOID

- handicapped
- disabled
- special children
- crippled
- autistic
- slow or slow learner
- the blind/the deaf
- confined to a wheelchair
- emotionally disturbed
- normal

The words you use in a conversation can make all the difference in making those around you feel respected. People First Language and positive words are important to making our community more inclusive and welcoming to people of all abilities. 5 Tips for Hosting an Inclusive Gathering

Help Friends with Disabilities Be a Part of the Fun

Everyone loves a good party – the food, the fun, the friends. Unfortunately, more often than not, people with disabilities are left out of the mix. People with disabilities like to get out and meet new people too, so why not consider holding a gathering where all guests – with and without disabilities – feel welcomed and have fun. All it takes is some pre-planning to ensure your gatherings are inclusive, fun and welcoming to all.

- Don't be afraid to include guests with disabilities People with disabilities love parties and want to participate in all the festivities. If you know someone has a disability, use a simple strategy – ask the person what they need to be fully included. If it's an event that includes children, parents can tell you, right off the bat, what their child's needs might be to attend the event.
- 2. Special diets Anyone can have allergies, celiac disease or lactose intolerance, but you won't know unless you ask in advance or even on the invitation or RSVP. Making sure there are alternative options for cake, snacks, treats and other food for guests with special diets can be as simple as picking up a gluten free cupcake to serve with the cake. If you have someone coming who uses a wheelchair, consider putting food on tables that are low enough for them to serve themselves.
- 3. Sensory overload awareness Large gatherings may cause sensory overload for some children or adults. For a person with autism or a sensory processing disorder, a large gathering may be really overwhelming. Offer opportunities for guests to take a break, perhaps in a quiet room away from the crowd. Consider turning down the music or minimizing stimulation which is also useful anywhere there is a lot of kids.
- 4. Cognitive and vision considerations If you are planning activities, remember children and adults with cognitive, learning disabilities or vision impairments might not be able to read instructions for a scavenger hunt or a game score sheet. Pictures and verbal instructions are useful, as well as pairing participants with those who can help.
- 5. Opportunities for learning about each other Children (and adults, too) can be cautious when encountering someone who is different from them. If children are attending your event, you can talk to them at the start of the event about kindness and respect for each other and each other's differences. A party is a great opportunity for everyone to learn about one another, what you have in common, and make new friends regardless of ability.

Finally, remember to enjoy your gathering. Don't let inclusion stress you out. If you are reading this list and considering these tips, you are already doing more than most. Stay positive, smile and have a great time.

March plant of the month: Black-eyed Susan

The Rudbeckia hirta gets its common name "Black-eyed Susan" from the dark brown center cone of the flower. In the language of flowers, the Black-eyed Susan represents "justice." They are native to Northeast Ohio and the northeastern United States, zones 3-9. They attract bees, beneficial insects, birds and butterflies to your home garden. Best of all, they are deer

resistant.

They are drought tolerant once established. As "sun worshipers" they put on their best show in full sun. They will tolerate partial sun, but the blooms will not be as prolific. The daisy-like flower is a dazzling golden yellow and

typically measures about 2 to 3 inches in diameter on 8-inch flower stems. Plants typically reach about 3 feet in height and bloom from early summer through early autumn frost.

The species name hirta means "hairy" and refers to the hairyfuzzy texture of the leaves. Water the plant at soil level to avoid water on the leaves and to prevent fungal disease. They tend to spread both by seed and rhizomes, so give them space. You can control spreading by deadheading spent flowers. You can choose to leave seed heads for the birds to enjoy and spread the golden joy of blooms the following season. They are a considered a shortlived perennial so by leaving the seed heads on through winter, you will encourage self-seeding and naturalization, as a meadow.

Today, there are many hybrids of the rudbeckia genus that vary from annual to biennial and perennial. Flower colors range from shades of red, to orange, to yellow. The Perennial Plant Association has named rudbeckia "American Gold Rush," the 2023 Perennial of the Year.

If you are growing Black-eyed Susans for ornamental purposes, then pair them with companion plants that will enhance their natural beauty. Some of the best companion perennial plants include Russian sage, purple coneflower, fountaingrass, yarrow and daisies. Cosmos, salvia and zinnias are complementary annuals for Black-eyed Susans.

Indigenous people have used the roots as medicine to treat earaches, get rid of parasitic worms and treat snakebites.

If you are looking for a low maintenance, high impact, stunning mass planting, then plant Black-eyed Susans this spring. Plant a meadow, fill a vase and enjoy! You might find that those fireflies of summers gone by just may come back for a visit. ∞

Discount Drug Mart property owners file for annexation

Feb. 7 township trustees meeting


Hinkley trustees indicated they are likely to file a formal objection to the proposed annexation of 5.12 acres of township land at the southeast corner of W. 130th Street and Center Road to the city of Brunswick.

Trustee Jack Swedyk said that the board has been notified by Medina County Commissioners that a petition for annexation has been filed and a hearing is scheduled before Medina County Commissioners on Wednesday, April 11.

The township has until March 27, or 15 days prior to the hearing, to file an objection. If the county fails to receive any objections prior to that date, commissioners are expected to approve the annexation without any discussion on the matter.

Representatives for Discount Drug Mart requested a community reinvestment area property tax abatement for the site last spring. With the assistance of the Medina County Economic Development Corporation, an abatement was crafted for the property, set at 50% of the assessed real property investment amount of \$3.5 million for a term of 15 years.

On June 7, trustees voted 2-1 against the abatement. Swedyk was the lone yes vote, noting the proposed 50% property tax contribution, would generate more

revenue than the township currently receives for it.

Trustee Melissa Augustine asked the board to reach out to Drug Mart officials and offer a 15-year, 100% tax abatement to remain competitive with Brunswick, which offers companies a 15-year, 100% property tax abatement on new structures. She made a similar recommendation last September.

"This way we can keep one more piece of Hinckley so they don't take any more bites out of it," she said.

Swedyk said he doesn't believe the township is in a good position to renegotiate the terms of the CRA after trustees rejected the initial proposal.

"They came to us in good faith, and it didn't pass," he said. "We're in a much weaker position now to try and negotiate anything at this point."

Trustee Monique Ascherl said she believes the township has to take action prior to the hearing.

"The clock is ticking on this," she said. "I think it is something we are better off moving forward with sooner rather than later. ... I think it's important for us to be very proactive with this. ... I believe this is something most [of the community] would encourage us to fight."

Other business

Trustees unanimously approved awarding a \$286,070 bid for the 2023 paving project. Affected streets include Bellus Road, between Ridge Road and Hinckley Hills Road, and Mattingly Road.

Police Chief David Centner also announced the township will host a public information session on Saturday, March 11, at 9 a.m. The session will address new phone and email scams circulating throughout the community.

"This is a never-ending problem, not only for us but for every law enforcement agency in America," Centner said. "These individuals get very good at what they do. As much as we try to put out there on Facebook, there's no end to it. These people will stoop to any level to steal money from people." ∞

Destination Lodi: A Historical Journey Medina County's oldest voter

LODI — Yes, Lodi is again number one in Medina County history on Aug. 24, 1926.

Augustus Markel was born on Aug. 4, 1827. At the time of voting, he was 99 years old. He married Lovina Smith (1831-1905) on Oct. 11, 1849. The couple would raise three children – Imogene,

Ruth and Clinton - in Wayne County.

Mr. Markel had enlisted as a drummer boy to serve a year in the 2nd regiment, Ohio Volunteer Infantry in the war with Mexico under Col. George W. Morgan. He was later assigned to Gen. Winfield Scott's Army, with Gen. U.S. Grant. He was in the engagement of the battle of Buena Vista in Mexico Feb. 22 to 23, 1847. He was honorably discharged July 28, 1848 at Cincinnati.

Mr. Markel re-enlisted again in the Civil War July 30, 1862, as a sergeant, serving three years in Company E. 102nd Regiment. He served under Col. William Given, being engaged in many fierce conflicts. He was honorably discharged Nov. 25, 1862 at Bowling Green on account of a disability. He became a member of the G.A.R. post, No. 123 at Wooster.

At his advanced age, Mr. Markel was in good health. He enjoyed telling his war experiences and could relate the circumstances as clearly as though it happened a few days ago.

Mr. Markel cast a Republican vote, as he said he never failed to do so. He would come to the polls in the company of his daughter-in-law, Clara, with whom he lived on their farm three miles west of Lodi. He lived with his son Clint and Clara until his death.

Augustus Markel and wife Lovina are buried at Wooster Cemetery. His son Clinton and wife Clara are buried at Woodlawn in Lodi.

Lake Medina was creat-ed in the early 1960s when the city of Medina was looking for a way to supplement its water supply. In 2002, due to increasing demands for water usage as the city grew, an alternate water supply from Lake Erie was developed, and Lake Medina was no longer needed as a water supply.

In 2003, MCPD secured a lease agreement with the city of Medina to turn the 103-acre lake into a county park. Currently, Lake Medina

can be accessed off state Route 18 as well as from Granger Road. The park boasts two hiking trails

The all-purpose 1.4-mile Greenway Trail is an asphalt path that follows willows and sycamores along the west branch of the Rocky River and connects to the city of Medina's paved trail along Reagan Parkwav.

The other 1.08-mile gravel trail is located along the top of the dam overlooking the lake. Lake Medina is an important water source for wildlife particularly waterfowl, bald eagles and osprey. From late-February through the end of April each year Lake Medina serves as a rest stop for migratory waterfowls such as loons, grebes and a variety of ducks, geese and swans.

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

Treasurer John Burke reports County interest earnings top \$2 million

At the recent Investment Advisory Board Meeting, Medina County Treasurer Burke reported that investment earnings for the County totaled \$2,087,913 in 2022, up 61% from the previous year.

Burke said the large increase of \$795,112 was the result of a successful investment strategy implemented to take advantage of rising interest rates in the financial markets.

"This increase of investment revenue is extra income for the



County which can be used by the Commissioners to help pay for services and operational costs of the County," said Burke. "This extra revenue source also

helps to diminish the need for additional taxes."

At the beginning of 2022, interest earnings from the investment portfolio were projected to be \$1,300,000 for the entire year.

Because of the changes in the financial market, Burke rebalanced the maturity of the investments in the County's portfolio to take advantage of higher short-term rates.

"This investment strategy brought in an additional \$800,000 by the end of the year," Burke said. He reported that the increase in interest rates over the last year was largely due to the Federal Reserve increasing their fund's rate charged to banks.

In 2022, the Fed increased their interest rate eight times from 0.25% to 4.5%. As a result, the cost of borrowing money from the banks dramatically increased.

For example, home mortgage rates have more than doubled to over 6%.

"These changes in the financial market provided opportunities to earn higher interest earnings on various investments according to their type and maturity," he noted.

As Treasurer, Burke oversees the County's investment portfolio which currently has over \$168 million invested.

"We normally have about 120 to 170 different investments on any given day," Burke explained.

The largest investment allocation currently is 49% in US Government agencies such as Federal Farm Credit Bank, Federal National Mortgage Association, Sallie Mae Bank, and Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp.

The second largest investment of 24% is currently in U.S. Treasuries.

To make those investments, the Ohio Revised Code requires County Treasurers to take continuing education courses each year approved by the State of Ohio Treasurer and Auditor.

Besides completing his annual hours of continuing education, Treasurer Burke has also earned other certifications such as the "Chancellor's Certification for Public Administration" from IGO International Government Officials Association; "Financial Of-ficer Certification" from National Association of Treasurers and Finance Officials (NACTFO); and numerous Professional Development Awards from the County Treasurer's Association of Ohio (CTAO).

"Continual learning is important for every public fund manager to safely invest public funds and get the highest yield possible," stated Burke who also has a BA and a Master's in business administration from Miami University.

Treasurer Burke is chairman of the County Investment Advisory Board which meets quarterly to review the investment portfolio managed by the Treasurer.

Other members of the Investment Advisory Board include the three County Commissioners and the County Clerk of Courts.

World Water Day: protecting water quality

Watershed Education Coordinator World Water Day is a few weeks away. On Wednesday, March 22, people and organizations across the globe are taking action to solve the water and sanitation crisis. This year's theme is "Accelerating Change."

In Ohio, some of us have never experienced a lack of access to water, but this is not true for all Ohioans, nor has it been true throughout Ohio's recent history.

In 2014, a few counties west of here, residents in Toledo were without safe drinking water due to a toxic bloom of cyanobacteria, which tainted Lake Erie's water.

This year, Ohioans in Columbiana County are watching, testing, and worrying about their water after the train derailment in East Palestine, Ohio.

However, it doesn't take a tragedy or emergency for people to notice changes in their water.

People struggle with water polluted from runoff that runs into their ponds or lakes. People's properties erode as storms increase in severity and as land is developed.

Nonetheless, there are daily efforts in Medina County to improve and protect its waters' health.

Groups including Medina Soil & Water Conservation District, the Rocky River Watershed Council, Continued on page 7 🕚

Adult camperships are available to adults ages 22 and older, who live in Medina County, are eligible for county board services and are not currently receiving Medicaid Waiver funding.



5 Things People with Developmental Disabilities Want You to Know

1. Having a disability isn't a bad thing — what's bad is the way people treat me.

"I wish my friends knew the hardest part about having a developmental disability isn't my disability itself. It's the way people treat me because of it that's most challenging. I live in a world that is basically inaccessible and doesn't think about the inclusion of people like me. When you look at me, I want you to see both my disability and my abilities and all that comes with them. Disability isn't a bad thing.

2. "Disability" isn't a bad word.

"Many people have been taught to feel uncomfortable around disability. It starts with children when they look, wonder or ask questions about someone with a disability, sometimes adults take this wonderful learning opportunity and dismiss it with a statement of 'it's rude to stare.' The silent message is that a child should just pretend that the person with a disability doesn't exist. Those children grow into adults who are uneasy to think about, talk about, or acknowledge disability. People also often use words like 'special needs' to describe people with developmental disabilities. But 'special' would be if I needed to eat dragon eggs for breakfast. 'Special' would be if I always needed to sleep in a tree. I need employment, I need love and support and acceptance, and I need to be invited to be included. Those are basic human needs."

3. Don't exclude me from plans just because you think I won't be able to participate.

"It's natural for people to assume that I can't do something because of my disability, but I'm always up for trying anything new and going on any adventure. Having a disability that limits my involvement in some things is very isolating, and it's all too easy to feel forgotten or ignored because people stop thinking to include me. "

4. It's OK to laugh sometimes.

"I feel much more comfortable when I'm with people who are able to laugh off the occasional awkwardness caused by my different abilities and perspectives on the world around me. Sometimes I mispronounce common words and sometimes someone asks me a question and I hear something wildly different. Pretending it didn't happen makes it more awkward (I can usually sense something is up). It's much better to gently point out any confusion or mistake and then laugh about it with me."

5. There's more to me than just my disability.

"I am a person before my disability. I have been referred to in some social situations as 'that blind girl.' This can be upsetting, as I am many things before my blindness and it does not define me. I love shopping, horse



riding, 'Grey's Anatomy,' and I just happen to be blind. People with disabilities are capable of doing many things. Yes, our disability can make it hard for us to do certain things, but that does not mean we are limited in living life."

How crafting benefits kids

Kids have boundless energy. Parents of young children can look to various activities to harness that energy, and crafting is one endeavor that makes use of kids' enthusiasm and creativity.

Craft projects are more than just a means to getting energetic youngsters to sit down and focus their attention. Crafting pays various dividends for youngsters, some of which may surprise parents.

Crafting and hand-eye coordination

young children. Craft projects, particularly those that require cutting and gluing, do not provide instant gratification because they require multiple steps and time to dry before they're completed. North Shore Pediatric Therapy notes that such projects teach kids self-regulation because they require youngsters to exhibit self-control and patience until the project can be considered finished.

Crafting and the classroom

A 2018 report from the AAP noted that children who use their hands are strengthening areas in the brain that are associated with spatial and mathematical learning. This is an important benefit of crafting and one that the AAP report notes is not gained by kids who forgo physical activities like crafting for play that relies on interactive media. The benefits of crafting associated with spatial and mathematical learning could help younger children once they begin their academic careers.

Crafting helps children develop hand-eye coordination. The Illinois-based North Shore Pediatric Therapy notes that crafts that involve drawing shapes, cutting patterns and writing require youngsters to use their fine motor coordination. Coloring, drawing and cutting also require children to use their hands together, helping to develop and strengthen their hand-eye coordination. That development can help kids perform a host of additional tasks, including tying shoes, buttoning coats and eating independently.

Crafting and creativity

Crafting presents a great opportunity for kids to explore their creativity. The American Academy of Pediatrics urges parents to prioritize creative, unplugged playtime for infants and toddlers, and that can include time devoted to craft projects. Craft projects can include more complicated undertakings in which kids follow directions, or they can simply allow kids to create something from their own imaginations. Each type of project involves creating something new and encourages kids to develop their creative skills.

Crafting and patience

Parents know that patience is not necessarily a virtue of

How switching the clocks can affect your health

Much of the world adjusts their clocks each spring and fall. In the fall, clocks are fixed on standard time, while in the spring they're moved forward one hour to daylight saving time, or DST.

The rationale behind DST has long been based on energy savings, as the demand for electricity to light homes is related to the times when people go to bed at night and rise in the morning. Studies conducted by the U.S. Department of Transportation in 1975 determined that moving clocks ahead one hour could save a small amount of energy each day. In New Zealand, power companies registered a 3.5 percent decrease in usage when daylight savings starts. Even though the energy savings associated with DST can be significant, some suggest those savings come at the expense of human health.

Research suggests that a one-hour time change twice a year can significantly throw off humans' internal clocks. A report conducted by the Massachusetts Legislature in the summer of 2016 found that people lose a significant amount of sleep in the days following DST, which can lead to an increase in both traffic fatalities and on-the-job injuries. Disrupted sleep cycles can leave people restless and coping with anxiety. A 2012 study published in the Journal of Applied Psychology found shifts related to DST led to killing time on the internet and other "loafing" around from lack of energy and motivation.

Finnish researchers analyzed more than 10 years of stroke data and its relation to DST. The overall rate of ischemic stroke increased by 8 percent in the first two days after transitioning to DST.

Similarly, other issues arise when clocks are switched back to standard time in the fall. Danish researchers found

the rate of people seeking care for depression rose for up to 10 weeks after clocks were turned back.

Various petitions have been created to urge legislators to maintain DST all year long. The United Kingdom-based Royal Society for the Prevention

of Accidents says doing so will reduce road deaths currently caused by darker evenings in autumn and winter. Keeping the time consistent can help avoid body clock resets, may prevent accidents and could increase productivity in the evening hours when the autumn arrives. Only time will tell if turning the clocks back and moving them forward will become a relic of the past.

MEDINA, Ohio -- The Medina County Board of Developmental Disabilities is encouraging leadership on the part of people who have developmental disabilities.

The MCBDD's new leadership academy will help clients learn the skills they need to take on local leadership roles.

"It is a six-month program so they can identify their leadership skills," said Pam Hunt, director of community development for the MCBDD.

She shared that people who have developmental disabilities have expressed interest in the program and want their voices to be heard.

"They're often overlooked when it comes to leadership roles," she said.

The program will cover topics including understanding leadership, roles and responsibilities, personal leadership profile, communicating and listening, problem solving, interview skills, types of leadership opportunities and goal setting.

"People with disabilities have a wide variety of talents and opinions and want to be more involved as valued citizens in community decisions," MCBDD Advocacy Coordinator Michelle Fortney said in a recent press release.

"They want opportunities to contribute and participate in decision-making processes. Whether its serving on a local nonprofit board, participating in committees or making their voices heard in local government, people with developmental disabilities want the same chances as everyone else to help shape their communities."

Fortney shared that those who have expressed interest have asked how to get more involved, but "they don't know where to start. This program will give them the tools."

She said this is a program they have every intention of continuing, but they are starting out small. Additionally, she shared that they'd eventually be interested in partnering with small businesses in the future.

"It's exciting to us that people want to be involved in their community," Fortney said.

The program is for those 18 and older who have developmental disabilities. The application is due March 17. Class size is limited.

State recertifies Lodi Police Department

The Office of Criminal Justice Services announced Thursday the certification and recertification of six Ohio law enforcement agencies for state standards established by the Ohio Collaborative Community-Police Advisory Board.

One agency, Blanchester Police Department in Clinton County, adopted and implemented the initial two standards regarding use of force and hiring and recruitment. An additional five agencies completed the recertification process that takes place on a revolving, three to four-year cycle, with one being the Lodi Police Department.

Overall, there are 606 certified agencies throughout Ohio that have met the initial standards.

Starting a Nonprofit

When starting to raise funds or giveaway money or gifts, it is important to be aware of the laws and taxes governing such activities.

Laws have been put in place to protect all involved, from the donor to the recipient and the organization itself.

Nonprofits are required to state their objectives, set operating standards, and name a board to oversee its operations.

A 501c3 status allows the organization to raise, spend and gift funds without paying taxes as long as it maintains IRS requirements. If the IRS rules an entity is not operating properly, the entity will be required to change its status and potentially pay taxes.

As a donor, gifts to organizations with 501c3 status are eligible for a tax deduction.

Many businesses and foundations require their donations go only to 501c3 nonprofits to ensure the businesses are eligible for the tax benefits and as a way to ensure legitimacy.

The IRS has a long, detailed form utilizing tax language that can be difficult to complete if one lacks the expertise of a tax accountant.

The form has to be completed and mailed to the IRS. The organization then waits for a letter giving approval from the IRS that grants them nonprofit status and assigns them a 501c3 tax identification number.

The IRS may ask for clarifying information before approval and could deny the application if requirements have not been met.

The state of Ohio requires a nonprofit to file articles of incorporation with the secretary of state detailing the organization's structure and how it will function.

There is an expectation by the IRS and the state of Ohio

that there will be a board that will regularly meet and keep records of these meetings. Ohio requires nonprofits to file a statement of continuing existence form with the secretary of state every five years.

After the nonprofit is established, regular filings with the IRS and Ohio attorney general must be made.

The amount of money an organization raises over the course of the year determines which form to file with the IRS.

In Ohio, nonprofits are required to make an annual charitable filing with the attorney general's office.

The Ohio attorney general's website is available to everyone who wants review the annual charitable filings for an organization at https://bit.ly/3XKUFgW

Available information includes the legal name of the organization, the tax identification number, address, date of formation, its purpose, names of board members, financial information, and if the registration is current.

The nonprofit has the ultimate responsibility to make sure these filings are made to the IRS and attorney general. Many nonprofits have an accountant and/or attorney to help with these forms.

State charitable filings will be checked as well to ensure the nonprofit is still functioning and performing its legal filings.

It shows a level of trust and legitimacy when a nonprofit takes the time to ensure these forms are filed correctly and in a timely manner.
