Regular Board Meeting Minutes
July 24, 2023

I. Call to Order

The MCBDD Regular Board Meeting was called to order by Board President Wayne Carroll at 5:08 p.m. Other Board Members present included the following: Dave Hartman, Andy Olah, Lisa Dreaden, Mark Gryskiewicz, and Ann Salek. Sandra Thomas Fain was not present (unsure of reason for absence).

Staff present included the following: Stacey Maleckar, Annie Finnerty, Shannon Lees, Diana Davis, Sabrina Johnson, Carey Bates, Patti Hetkey, Ed Dryer, Paula Majoros, Zachary Kascak, and Marcy Batke.

Others present included the following: Delphenia Gilbert from SandiCare.

II. General Session

A. Pledge of Allegiance

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

B. Mission Statement Affirmation

The Mission Statement was recited.

C. Approval of Minutes

- Approval of the Minutes from the Regular Board Meeting, June 26, 2023

A Motion was made by Ms. Salek, seconded by Ms. Dreaden, to approve the Minutes from the Regular Board Meeting on June 26, 2023. The Motion was approved with a unanimous “yes” vote.

D. Presentation

1. Path to Employment/Career Planning

Mr. Dryer shared the following information with the Board:

There are four Paths to Employment:

- **Path 1** – Currently have a community job
- **Path 2** – Wants a community job but needs help
- **Path 3** – Not sure about a job, wants more information
- **Path 4** – Does not want a job at this time

Mr. Dryer focused on two components of Career Planning:

- **Career Discovery** – Individualized, comprehensive process to identify individual interests, skills and strengths related to competitive community employment.
- **Career Exploration** – Visiting a variety of worksites or informational interviews to better understand community employment jobs.
- The other three components are Job Development, Benefit Analysis, and Self-Employment.

Mr. Dryer shared the Action Plan Focus Areas to which this presentation relates (Focus Area 1, 4b; Focus Area 3, 3a; Focus Area 3, 3b).

- Everyone in our system should be on one of the four paths.
- Providers are involved in the process.
- Parents and guardians are involved through Team meetings.
- Parents or guardians are welcome to share job leads with the Community Supports Department.
- Most agencies who are providing Community Employment services have hired a job developer.

E. Follow Up

Ms. Maleckar reviewed the Follow Up information that was shared with the Board regarding the following topics.

1. Cost breakdown for June Resolution #20-23 – this was emailed to the Board Members on June 29, 2023.
2. SSA caseload assignment – assignments are made based on the specific needs of each individual.
3. Windfall pre-school children follow-along data – Mr. Carroll’s specific question was if the children who have moved out of specialized services continue to be out of specialized services when they leave the Windfall pre-school program and what is the long-term effect of Windfall pre-school. Ms. Batke stated that we do not track data regarding the children once they leave Windfall pre-school, but many move to specialized education programs at their home school. Mr. Carroll requested data regarding the long-term effects of EI and Windfall pre-school. Ms. Dreaden stated she is concerned about making decisions based on such a small sampling of children. The Board agreed. Mr. Olah stated that communication between the MCBDD and the school districts is very important.
4. Case management for those not assigned a MCBDD SSA – EI children are assigned to Service Coordinators. There are 142 individuals in Medina County residing in ICFs; these individuals are all assigned a Q through the ICF. The numbers on the enrollee stats report will never totally align due to constant changes in mainly EI children aging in and out.
5. CEUs for the Guardianship training – We will update on this once we have all the information needed to move forward.

F. Old Business

G. New Business

1. Excess Property Resolution #25-23

A Motion was made by Mr. Hartman, seconded by Ms. Dreaden, to approve Resolution #25-23 to declare the requested items as excess property and unusable by the Medina County Board of Developmental Disabilities. The Motion was approved with a unanimous “yes” vote.

2. Policy Review and Approval

A Motion was made by Mr. Olah, seconded by Mr. Gryskiewicz, to approve the policy revisions as submitted. Mr. Hartman referenced a few of the policy changes and asked if we are looking to make the agency accountable at the procedure level rather than the policy level. Ms. Finnerty stated it is at both levels. She stated that policy is the over-arching philosophy where procedures are more internal processes. She also stated that we are held accountable in a variety of ways from multiple outside agencies including CARF, State Accreditation, ODE, the Health Department, county financial audits, etc. Mr. Hartman asked Ms. Hetkey why the words “programs which serve them” were removed from the Coordination of Media policy. Ms. Hetkey stated that removing that portion actually allows us a broader ability to publicize not only the county board, but also those involved in our local system as well. The Motion was approved with a unanimous “yes” vote.

G. Reports Review

- Superintendent’s Report – Ms. Maleckar reviewed the Superintendent’s Report and addressed questions from the Board.
- Financial Reports – Ms. Bates reviewed the following:

 - No concerns regarding revenue.
 - Expenses
 - We are currently at 42% as of June 30, 2023.
 - There were three pays in June.
 - Special Projects: DSP referral-\$750.00.
 - Match: six individuals residing in a DC.
 - There was one more pay period in June of 2023 vs. June of 2022.
 - Special Projects: provider support efforts restarted.
 - No concerns at this time.
 - Cash Balance
 - Fund Balance: \$37M.
 - Cash Flow
 - Monthly Cash Flow: \$1.2M of fund balance used.
- Voucher Report
 - Questions from the Board were addressed.

A Motion was made by Mr. Hartman, seconded by Mr. Gryskiewicz, to approve Resolution #26-23 to approve the Financial Reports for June, 2023. The Motion was approved with a unanimous “yes” vote.

September 2023

SSA

- The SSA Department enjoyed our annual picnic on 8/11. Everyone participated and had a great time.
- The SSA Department participated in a training with Kathy Sullivan, Coach from Talent Principles, on 8/25/23. This was the first of several trainings the SSA Department will be undergoing as we focus on building trust, relationships, and communication skills.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

- On 7/31 – 8/6 at the Medina County Fair, the MCBDD promoted general agency information.
- On 8/16 at the Wadsworth Back to School Fair, the MCBDD promoted Early Intervention and general agency information.
- On 8/16 at the Brunswick Business at the Barn, the MCBDD promoted Community Employment supports and general agency information.
- The MCBDD celebrated DSP Appreciation Month with the following: articles in local newspapers, yard signs, social media, DSP Spotlight nominations, and videos.
- On 9/19, the MCBDD hosted the OACB Region 6 Communications Meeting.
- On 9/23, the MCBDD held the second Free Community Shred Day of the year. Donations from this event go toward the Donor Scholarship fund.

EARLY INTERVENTION

- The last Toddler Playgroup for this year was held on 9/11. Approximately 70 people, including children, siblings, and adults were in attendance. We also had a record number of EI staff members in attendance (eight), to assist and interact with their EI families. There were quite a few returning families, as well as new ones who had recently learned of the event. Several families commented on how valuable the group has been, and one great grandparent asked how she could go about donating to the group!
- Referral numbers have remained steady.
- The state reached out to congratulate Medina County on our response rate to the family questionnaire mid-way through the process and asked us to share our strategies. Last year's response rate was 25%; mid-way through we were at 23%. We received an update this week, and we are at 31%, which did not include any mail in surveys, and there is still a little time left to go. Kuddos to staff for their efforts in facilitating family participation.

SCHOOL AGE AND PRESCHOOL

- Windfall School is off to a good start. We have five new school-age students this year; three students with autism and two students with multiple disabilities.

COMMUNITY SUPPORTS & DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT

Community Partnerships

- A kickoff meeting was held at the Medina County Career Center on Friday, 8/25, for the DSP-U Program. A total of four students will be taking part in the curriculum as part of their Medina County Career Center classes. In addition, the students will be interning at local providers for a total of 100 hours. The MCBDD is very excited about this partnership with the Medina County Career Center and the Ohio Association of DSPs.
- The MCBDD hosted a DSP Appreciation event at the Cleveland Zoo on 9/14. Over 250 DSPs, Individuals, and families attended the event. In addition to the entry tickets, the MCBDD provided ice cream, give-away items, and raffled off gift baskets for the DSPs in attendance. We are also happy to announce that DODD sent a representative to the event to show appreciation for our local DSPs.
- During National Disability Employment Awareness Month (NDEAM), the MCBDD will be partnering with county boards throughout Northeast Ohio to host an Employment Summit on 10/20. This event will include representatives from Individuals, families, providers, employers, OOD, schools, and county boards to discuss Competitive Employment, Employment First, and other topics regarding hiring individuals with Developmental Disabilities in competitive jobs.

Self-Advocacy

- **August Advocacy Meeting**

- 15 individuals and their support staff participated in the meeting.
- Topics included state and local happenings with a discussion on House Bill 33.
- Ways to participate in your community to promote inclusion were also discussed.
- We learned about the importance of using assertive communication when voicing opinions and needs.
- The meeting ended with a roundtable discussion to try out assertive communication skills.

- **MCBDD Leadership Academy**

- In July, the MCBDD Leadership Academy participants learned time management and interviewing skills followed by mock interviews.
- In August, the MCBDD Leadership Academy participants learned about non-profit organizations, as well as the Board of Directors positions and their duties.

- **Advocacy Curriculum Training at Medina County Career Center**

- In August, Michelle Fortney, Community Resources Coordinator, began supporting transition students at the Medina County Career Center with the MCBDD Advocacy Curriculum Training. This training will support students by strengthening advocacy, communication, listening, and problem-solving skills prior to them setting out in career exploring.

- **People Together Program**

- Fall is now upon us and schools are back in session. That means the start of the People Together Program. The MCBDD will once again be in collaboration with The Society to teach local 3rd grade students disability awareness, acceptance, and inclusion throughout the 2023/2024 school year.

- **Advocacy Picnic**

- On 9/7, 22 Advocates and community members enjoyed an end of summer picnic. Adina K., along with her family, cooked dinner for everyone and shared their family heritage with us. Advocates joined in with sharing their family history and traditions. A great night was had by all.

Equestrian:

1. The MCBDD, along with the Ohio Alliance of DSP's (OADSP) and the Medina County Career Center (MCCC) kicked off the DSP-U program for this school year. Four students are excited to participate in the initial class. A DSP Recruitment and Retention Plan proposal has been created and shared with the Medina County Provider Leadership Network for feedback.
2. SSAs continue to grow relationships with providers through quarterly SSA/Provider Mingles. The 2nd quarter Mingle was held at Spokes 2 on 6/21 with 30 participants. The next Mingle is scheduled for 9/20 at The Society and will focus on the topic of "Positive Behavior Supports."
3. A DSP Appreciation event was held at the Cleveland Zoo on 9/14 with 250 tickets provided to DSPs. Also, gift baskets will be distributed to provider agencies for them to share with their DSPs. The initial layout for an updated provider website is in process.
4. The Employment Navigator continues to work with SSAs, which has created an increase in referrals for Career Planning. Data from around the state is showing efforts to incentivize providers to increase the use of remote supports has been found to be ineffective. An MCBDD Remote Supports committee is discussing remote supports and ways to address and effectively break down perceived barriers to increase use.

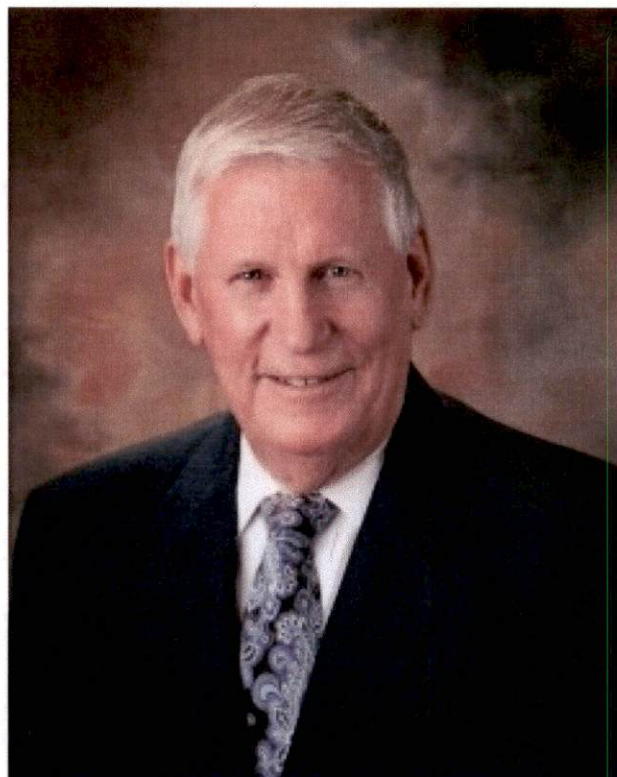

We extend our sincere and deepest condolences to the Calvert family on his passing and know people with developmental disabilities have lost a true advocate and friend.



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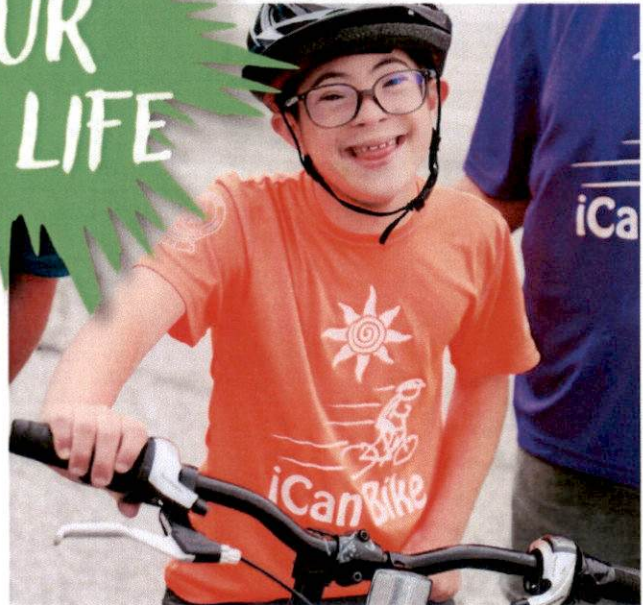

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those things that you know they would want to have for a successful respite stay," Thomas says.

Thomas agrees with Jean that asking about the actual medical and behavioral health supports needed is critical to the health and well-being of the individuals needing care.

Addressing these challenges from a higher level requires increased funding and support for respite care programs, enhanced training for caregivers and facility staff, improved accessibility in rural areas, and awareness campaigns to educate families about the benefits and availability of respite care services.

Jean adds it's increasingly important for community organizations to break down communication barriers.

"Establishing rapport

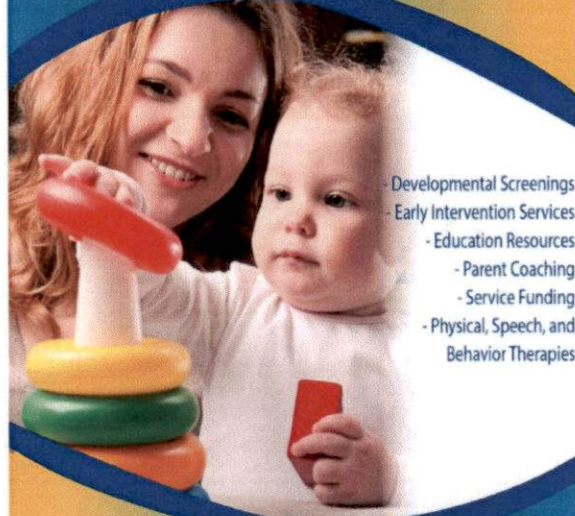
with the surrounding community is big," Jean says. "Communication is vital to helping the community become inclusive for our population."

Thomas says partnerships across programs and agencies is crucial, as each program may have some difference and unique implementations.

"Our screening and assessment process always includes the prospect of making referrals to other community and partner organizations to make sure the needs of the individual are met," Thomas says. "Our state has multiple waiver programs and oversight entities (Medicaid, Aging, DODD, Managed Care Plans), so it really is incumbent on us to always be providing updated accurate information that can span the programs."

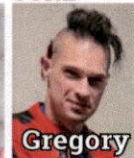

al place to host this program as we are dedicated to helping children with developmental disabilities fully understand the importance of each topic."

The original idea for Safety Town PLUS came from parents of children who attend the MCBDD's Windfall School.

These parents found other local Safety Towns could become too overwhelming and did not provide a tailored learning environment for their children, many with whom are on the autism spectrum.

MCBDD's Safety Town PLUS modifies instructions and creates multi-sensory activities to give students the best chances to practice important safety skills.

"We are so thrilled to have been able to provide Safety Town PLUS at the MCBDD for so many years," says Bajorek. "It has been so encouraging to see so many volunteers come together each year to make sure all children have the opportunity to learn how to be safe and how to react in an emergency. GEORGIA SUPREME COURT

Trump seeks to quash grand jury report

Weeks before he's expected to be indicted in Fulton County, former President Donald Trump revived his push to disqualify District Attorney Fani Willis from investigating him for election interference.

In a petition filed before the Georgia Supreme Court, Trump's attorneys also sought to quash the final report of a special purpose grand jury that recommended people be indicted. Additionally, they requested a ruling that would forbid Willis from using any evidence obtained by the investigative jury, which heard testimony from about 75 witnesses between May 2022 and Jan. 2023.

The motion filed on Thursday asks Georgia's highest court to put a halt to any ongoing proceedings "related to and flowing from the special purpose grand jury's investigation until this mat-

ter can be resolved." This would include any consideration of a possible indictment for alleged criminal meddling in Georgia's 2020 presidential election by one of two regular Fulton grand juries that were seated on Tuesday.

Trump's attorneys — Drew Findling, Marissa Goldberg and Jennifer Little — acknowledged that the state Supreme Court had never once taken on such a request for extraordinary relief in the four decades it has had jurisdiction to do so. But the motion said if Trump's case "is not sufficiently extraordinary for this court to exercise jurisdiction, no case could be."

"Even in an extraordinarily novel case of national significance, one would expect matters to take their normal procedural course within a reasonable time," the motion said. "But nothing about these processes have been normal or reasonable. And the all-but-unavoidable conclusion is that the anomalies below are because petitioner is President Donald J. Trump."

In March, Trump's attorneys filed a motion in Fulton Superior Court also asking officials to disqualify Willis and

toss out the special grand jury's findings. They noted this time that Judge Robert McBurney, the supervising judge of the special grand jury, has yet to rule on the motion and that Willis has notified local court officials and law enforcement she is likely to seek an indictment at some point between July 31st and Aug. 18th.

"Stalled between the supervising judge's protracted passivity and the district attorney's looming indictment, (Trump) has no meaningful option other than to seek this court's intervention," the motion said.

Willis' office previously said Trump's arguments for dismissal were barred by lack of standing, untimeliness and other procedural flaws. The Republican's efforts were premature because no one has been charged with a crime yet, prosecution said.

"If an investigation results in actual criminal charges against (Trump), the justice system ensures they will have no shortage of available remedies to pursue," the DA's May response argued.

Trump's lawyers also filed a similar motion in Fulton Superior Court on Fri-

day, saying they did so out of an abundance of caution.

A spokesman from the DA's office declined to comment on the state Supreme Court filing. McBurney did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

Both motions contend that Willis and McBurney "at every turn" have trampled on the procedural safeguards and rights of Trump and others under investigation.

"The whole of the process is now incurably infected," the motion said. "And nothing that follows could be legally sound or publicly respectable."

It asserted that the Georgia state legislature's creation of special grand juries was unconstitutional. It said that publication of excerpts of the final report would violate the former president's rights to fundamental fairness and due process and lead to "irremediable injury" to his reputation as he runs for the GOP nomination for president for a third time.

"(Trump) now sits on a precipice," his lawyers' motion said. "A regular Fulton County grand jury could return an

indictment any day that will have been based on a report and predicate investigative process that were wholly without authority."

Trump's attorneys also echoed arguments made previously by Willis' opponents — but rejected by several judges — that the special grand jury's proceedings were civil, not criminal, in nature. As a result, they said Willis was able to access evidence she should have been barred from because of that mischaracterization. They also contended that Willis should have been disqualified from the entire investigation, not just the portion involving Lt. Gov. Burt Jones, after she held a fundraiser for Jones' Democratic opponent last summer.

Trump was joined in his initial motion by Cathy Latham, the former head of the Coffee County GOP who served as an "altermate" Trump elector. Latham, who also greeted data technicians who copied confidential elections data from voting machines in Coffee County in Jan. 2021, was not a party to Friday's petition.

Disney asks a judge to toss a lawsuit from DeSantis, appointees

ORLANDO, Fla. — Disney asked a Florida judge on Friday to toss out a lawsuit against the company's efforts to neutralize a takeover of Disney World's governing district by Gov. Ron DeSantis and his appointees.

The case in Orlando is one of two stemming from the takeover of the company's public opposition to the so-called Don't Say Gay legislation championed by DeSantis and Republican lawmakers. Disney is fighting DeSantis in one lawsuit and his Disney World board appointees in another.

If the judge decides not to dismiss the state case, the

If the judge decides not to dismiss the state case, the entertainment giant asked that the state court case be put on hold until a federal lawsuit in Tallahassee is resolved since they cover the same ground and that lawsuit was filed first.

entertainment giant asked that the state court case be put on hold until a federal lawsuit in Tallahassee is resolved since they cover the same ground and that lawsuit was filed first.

In that case, Disney sued DeSantis and his appointees to the Central Florida Tourism Oversight District in an effort to stop the takeover, claiming the governor was violating the company's free speech and "weaponizing the power of government to punish private business."

"We are dealing with the same issue in both cases," Daniel Petrocelli, an attorney for Disney, told the judge during an hourlong hearing watched remotely by several

supervisors of their authority over design and construction. In response, DeSantis and Florida lawmakers passed the legislation that repealed those agreements.

Disney announced in May that it was scrapping plans to build a new campus in central Florida and relocate 2,000 employees from Southern California to work in digital technology, finance and product development. Disney had planned to build the campus about 20 miles from the park resort.

In an interview this week on CNBC, Disney CEO Bob Iger said the company didn't want to be involved in any culture wars.

"Our goal is to continue to tell wonderful stories and have a positive, positive impact on the world," Iger said.

Attorneys for the district's board asked that their case not be dismissed, telling the circuit judge that it wasn't moot and putting it on hold would be improper. They also argued that the board's lawsuit in state court was filed first since Disney's federal lawsuit wasn't properly served to the defendants.

DeSantis isn't a party in the state court lawsuit.

The judge didn't say when she would make a decision, but asked attorneys for both sides to prepare orders for her as if she had rendered a ruling in each of their favor by next Wednesday.

The fight between DeSan-

tis and Disney began last year after the company, facing significant pressure internally and externally, publicly opposed a state law banning classroom lessons on sexual orientation and gender identity in early grades, a policy critics call "Don't Say Gay."

As punishment, DeSantis took over the district through legislation passed by Florida lawmakers and appointed a new board of supervisors to oversee municipal services for the sprawling theme parks and hotels. But before the new board came in, the company made agreements with previous oversight board members who were Disney supporters that stripped the new

projects that I think that we can work on together also," because I really liked the way that came out."

That was when Theiss informed Shoup-Wilson about the idea of painting his barn in tribute to the state of Ohio. It started with an outline of the state and went on to include pictures of items representing various Ohio landmarks and historical milestones, including the state's oldest lighthouse in Marblehead, the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame and Museum in Cleveland, the annual Frog Jump Contest in Valley City and the world's only remaining double-barreled bridge in Preble County, among others.

Theiss and Shoup-Wilson said one taxing aspect of this project was choosing which highlights to include in the painting.

"It's been very, very interesting what came from Ohio and Ohio's history, and we didn't want to clutter it because there's a lot of other things I could have still put on there, but we just kind of talked it over and put the biggies on there," Theiss said.

"There are so many things," Shoup-Wilson said. "There could be 100 things

on there easily, but we had to edit it down to the most important, the most recognizable parts of Ohio."

While this may be the first time the painter has practiced her craft on the side of a barn, she recognizes this form of art is in a class by itself.

"You're not going to see this mural anywhere else," Shoup-Wilson said. "It's not going to be duplicated. And even if I were, if someone said, 'I want that mural on my barn,' it's not going to look the same because it's all painted by hand."

"There's a lot of work at both ends," Theiss explained. "The research and finding out about the various counties and then, from that point, how do you express that in artwork?"

Theiss said he hopes many people take the time to stop by the property and take a look at the unique masterpiece for themselves. He and Shoup-Wilson also hope it will inspire others to take advantage of seeing these Ohio landmarks for themselves.

"There's so many road trips people can take that they're just not aware of for Ohio," Shoup-Wilson said. "Everyone thinks they have to leave the state to go enjoy a vacation. You'd be surprised how much is here in Ohio."

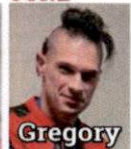

Fair Fun for All

Pre-Fair festival caters to kids with disabilities

The Medina County Fair may be a few weeks away, but one group of children and their parents enjoyed some fair festivities a bit early at the Medina County Fairgrounds on July 8.

The Medina County Junior Fair Board hosted its fourth annual Fair Friends event, treating children with developmental disabilities to an afternoon of fun, food, games and interaction with animals.

Junior Fair Board President Lexi Crow said the idea of Fair Friends came from a similar event she and other board members observed in Columbus.

"We went to a convention in Columbus, and we went to a session that talked about how a different fair does something similar," she said. "They have a special day for kids with developmental disabilities. So we took it on in our own sense, and we started planning it that first year, and we started super small, and from there we've grown."

Among the major highlights of

Fair Friends were the animals in two of the junior fair barns. Kids at the event saw cows, horses, lambs, chickens, goats, ducks and rabbits, and even had the chance to pet some of them.

Children enjoyed various arts-and-crafts activities at different stations located in the fairgrounds pavilion, including cookie decorating and making butterflies out of coffee filters. Some took time to strike a pose at a photo booth in the pavilion.

Many took advantage of the food trailer set up outside the pavilion and enjoyed French fries, Dippin' Dots and other fair favorites.

Several games were stationed throughout the pavilion and junior fair barns, giving the kids a chance to try their hand at ring toss and fishing for little plastic fish in a kiddie pool. Some sensory games were also available for the children to play inside one of the barns.

Parents utilized some of the stations at the event as well. The Ohio State University Medina

County Extension's master gardeners educated visitors about the extension's gardening classes. Medina County 4-H and the Medina County Board of Developmental Disabilities had tables set up in the pavilion to educate visitors about their services.

Crow said it took several months for the Junior Fair Board to coordinate Fair Friends.

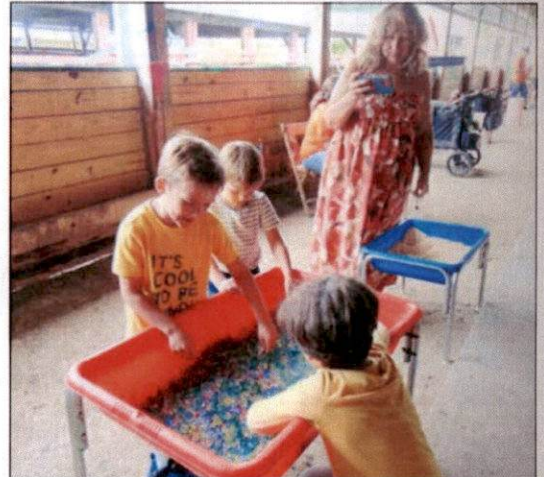
"We really start in January with sponsorships and volunteers and all that stuff," she said.

In the time since Fair Friends was first held, Crow said, the number of children who have attended the annual event has noticeably increased.

"We started with about 100 total and this year we have almost 200 total," she noted.

Crow said the goal of Fair Friends is to give children with developmental disabilities a chance to experience the recreational elements of the fair that are not only unique to the time of year but are also just plain fun.

might not be able to have any other time," she said. "It's definitely a smaller scale than having a project for 4-H or being at the fair. It's more sensory, available and that kind of stuff."

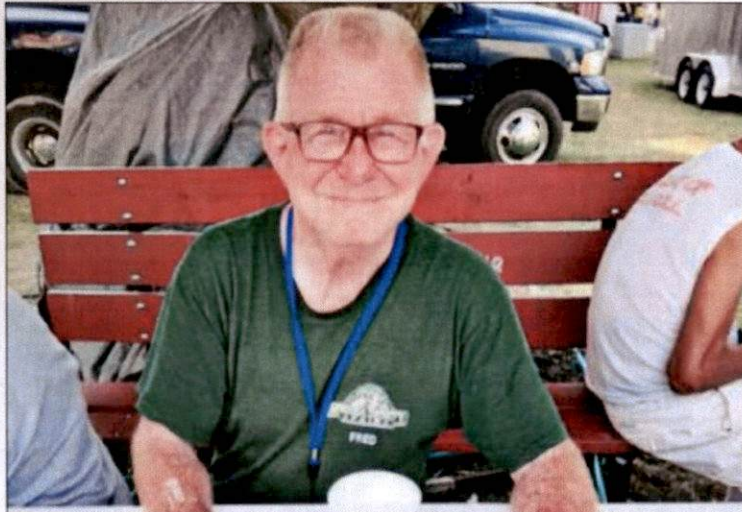

The Medina County Fair family is dedicating this year's fair to the memory of Frederick "Freddie" Riffner.

Riffner passed away Jan. 20 at the age of 84. The longtime Medina resident was one of the fair's "most dedicated helpers" for many years.

"We could always count on him to help pass out flyers and schedules," the Medina County Fair Board said in a statement. "He counted down the days until he was on vacation to spend all his time at the fairgrounds."

His "biggest passion," Riffner ran a tight ship manning his gate and keeping various areas of the fairgrounds prepared and swept, according to the board. He also served as added security during grandstand events, working closely with Medina County Sheriff's Office deputies.

Riffner also worked tirelessly the weeks prior to fair week, painting numbers for vendor spots.

"You could usually find him under his tree at his picnic table

watching the fairgoers or chatting with vendors and friends," the board said.

That picnic table is forever dedicated to Riffner with a plaque.

To help our students succeed through positive behavior support, our school practices the "Windfall Way." Families can also talk about the Windfall Way at home. The Windfall Way is based on four simple behavioral expectations:

Be Kind to Self Be Kind to Others Take Care of Our School Be Responsible



Every day our staff is on the lookout for positive behaviors and make a point to acknowledge their students' efforts with special notes home, stickers, and other surprises.

Just like any school, our students have school spirit. That is why each week we proudly show our school colors by celebrating Windfall Wednesday. Students can participate every Wednesday during the school year by wearing their Windfall Wildcat t-shirts or something with a royal blue color. The teachers and staff also join in by wearing their Windfall Wildcat shirts.

If you would like, shirts are available for you to purchase for your child to wear during our Windfall Spirit Wear sale in the fall. All of this school pride helps us to promote the Windfall Way and celebrate the successes of our students.

POSITIVE BEHAVIOR INSTRUCTIONAL SUPPORTS (PBIS)

PBIS is a multi-tiered system of behavioral supports which includes positive supports for all students and a system of support for the small number of students who require more intervention. The State of Ohio requires all school districts to design and implement a PBIS program in their schools.

Based on this requirement and Windfall School's desire to promote a positive school environment, we developed our own tiered system:

- Tier 1 includes school-wide teaching of expected behaviors, positive reinforcers, and recognition of students who exhibit the behavior expectations known as the Windfall Way.
- Tier 2 includes the addition of social skills curriculum and systematic teaching of appropriate behaviors.
- Tier 3 is for students who have a little more difficulty and require a more individualized program. It may include functional behavior assessments and a formal behavior plan, if needed.

ANNUAL FERPA NOTIFICATION

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act
Parents put their trust in us to ensure students' personal information and educational data is properly protected and used only for legitimate purposes and only when absolutely necessary. In accordance with FERPA, Windfall School is required to forward educational records upon request to other educational agencies. For more information, visit the Windfall School page on our website.

WEAPONS POLICY

The Medina County Board of DD and Windfall School leaders are committed to doing all we can to keep students and staff safe. No one should be afraid to come to school to learn or work or support a child's education.

The MCBD prohibits visitors from possessing, storing, making, or using a weapon, including a concealed weapon on grounds.

Exceptions to this policy include: weapons under the control of law enforcement personnel; objects indistinguishable from a firearm used during school safety trainings; any other exceptions permitted by law.

Unless otherwise authorized by law, pursuant to Ohio Revised Code 2923.122, no person shall knowingly possess, have under the person's control, convey, or attempt to convey a deadly weapon or dangerous ordnance into a school safety zone.

IMPORTANT REMINDERS



- The Windfall School day runs from 8:30 am until 2:45 pm. It is important to arrive at school on time. If you arrive late, please remember to sign your child in at the office.
- Remember to hold your child's hand in the parking lot and when crossing the driveway to the school entrance. When entering our driveway, our posted speed limit is 10 mph.
- Label anything your child brings to school: backpacks, extra clothes, hats, lunch boxes, etc.
- As a safety measure, your child is required to wear closed-toed shoes. Open toed shoes, such as flip-flops and sandals, are not allowed.

MEDICATION

Some students may need to receive medications during the school day.

• In order for any child to receive any type of medication (including over-the-counter items), medical treatment, or special diet while at school, a doctor's prescription is required. Please call the Windfall School Nurse as soon as you know your child may need one of these items. This allows the nurse to fully understand the situation and to ask any needed questions or to get necessary details. The school nurse can provide you with the form your child's doctor will need to complete or is able to fax a copy directly to your doctor's office. Forms are available on our website at www.mcbdd.org.

• For safety reasons, **students may not carry medication (including over-the-counter items) in their book bags.** The nurse is the only Windfall School staff member permitted to accept medications. Please call the Windfall School nurse to make arrangements for dropping off medications.

• Please remember to contact the school nurse immediately if there are any changes in your child's medications (i.e. dosage, discontinued, etc.).



SAFETY FIRST

We all know that accidents happen. Bumps and bruises are a part of every child's life. That's why we will let you know if your child receives even a minor bump or mark. You will be notified of any first aid treatment they received and follow-up care which may be needed or recommended.

We will contact you if your child arrives with a bruise or mark. We also ask you to notify the Windfall School nurse if your child receives some type of injury outside of school so that we are aware of any extra care to be taken during your child's day.

HEALTH AND SAFETY QUESTIONS?

Your child's health and safety are very important to us. If you have any questions, please contact the Windfall School Nurse at 330-725-7751 ext. 245.

SICK DAYS

Deciding whether to keep a sick child home isn't always an easy decision. While it is obvious that a very ill child belongs at home, there are some days when you need help to make the decision. That's why we have put together the following guidelines for you. These guidelines will protect not only the health of your child, but the health of classmates and school staff as well.

The main reasons to keep a child home from school are:

- too sick or too much discomfort to participate in a normal school schedule.
- might spread an illness to other students.

If your child is experiencing the following symptoms he/she should not attend school:

- Temperature 100 degrees and over
- Vomiting
- Diarrhea
- Frequent and persistent cough
- Sore throat
- Cold symptoms (excessive runny nose or nasal congestion)
- Persistent pain/discomfort (ear, throat, head, stomach, etc.)
- Ear pain/ear drainage
- Undiagnosed rash that is unable to be covered

How long should you keep your child home?

All children recover from illness at different rates but here are a few timelines:

- Pink Eye** 24 hours after physician ordered treatment begins
- Cough** When cough is no longer persistent
- Diarrhea** 24 hours after last episode without the use of medication
- Fever** 24 hours with temperature below 100 degrees without the use of medication
- Strep Throat** 24 hours after physician ordered treatment begins
- Vomiting** 24 hours after last episode of vomiting
- Laxative/Enema** Until the treatment has been effective
- Ringworm** Must be kept covered

Still not sure if your child should stay home from school?

A quick call to the Windfall School Nurse to discuss the situation may help.

Special Situations:

If your child has any type of medical procedure, emergency room visit/hospitalization, injury at home, exposure to a communicable disease (i.e. chicken pox), a seizure, or any other important medical event, please notify the Windfall School Nursing Office as soon as possible. The nurse will work with you and your doctor to make sure that we have all the information necessary for your child to return to school in a timely manner and that we are able to provide any additional support your child may need at school.



You want your child to be healthy and secure. Through our year-long Windfall Wellness program, we will be teaching students how to get moving and make healthy choices and habits a part of their everyday life.

At school we will be offering healthy snacks and drinks for our students, talking about personal safety, providing special health programs, and promoting healthy activities. We will also be sharing information with you about what we are learning and tips on what you can do at home to help your child be healthy and safe.

BREAKFAST AND LUNCH

Meals are important in a child's day. Whether you choose to provide your own meals or purchase from our cafeteria, one thing is for sure: your child needs healthy foods to learn and grow.

If your child requires a special diet, please provide a doctor's order to the school nurse, and contact the school cafeteria to discuss accommodations.

ATTENDANCE

Who should I notify if my child will not be attending school?

Notify the Windfall School Office at 330-725-7751, option 1, as soon as possible. If your child is not going to attend school on a particular day, it is important that you also notify your transportation provider (i.e. school district, private provider, etc.) before your scheduled pick-up time.



Alianna's Alert

In Ohio a law called Alianna's Alert, requires our school secretary to call parents/guardians by or before 10:30 am if your child is absent and you have not called to notify us.

SCHOOL VISITS

We welcome parent involvement and encourage support. It is very important to our program that we maintain the best and safest possible learning environment for our students during the day.

Teachers are able to schedule meetings, both virtual and, if necessary, in person at times that benefit both you and the students in our classrooms. If you need to schedule an in-person meeting, it is important - and state law requires - that regardless of how often you visit our buildings, you must always sign in as a visitor and be prepared with identification if asked.

For the safety of all children, school visitors must enter the main doors by the Windfall School Office and sign in at the reception window to receive a visitor's name tag. Thank you in advance for your cooperation.



TRANSPORTATION INFORMATION

You will be contacted by your local school district concerning your child's pick-up and drop-off times. Any changes you need to make to your child's transportation arrangements must be requested through your local school district.

Please do not send dangerous objects (glass, knives, firearms, ammunition, medication, etc.) or animals. These items will interfere with the safe operation of vehicles and will not be permitted.

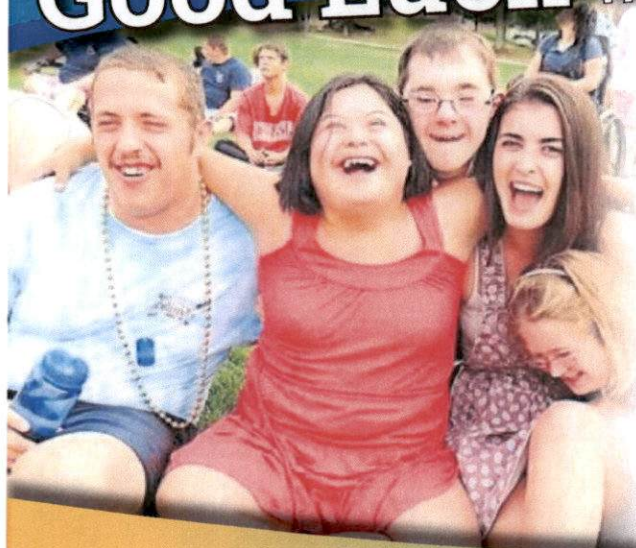

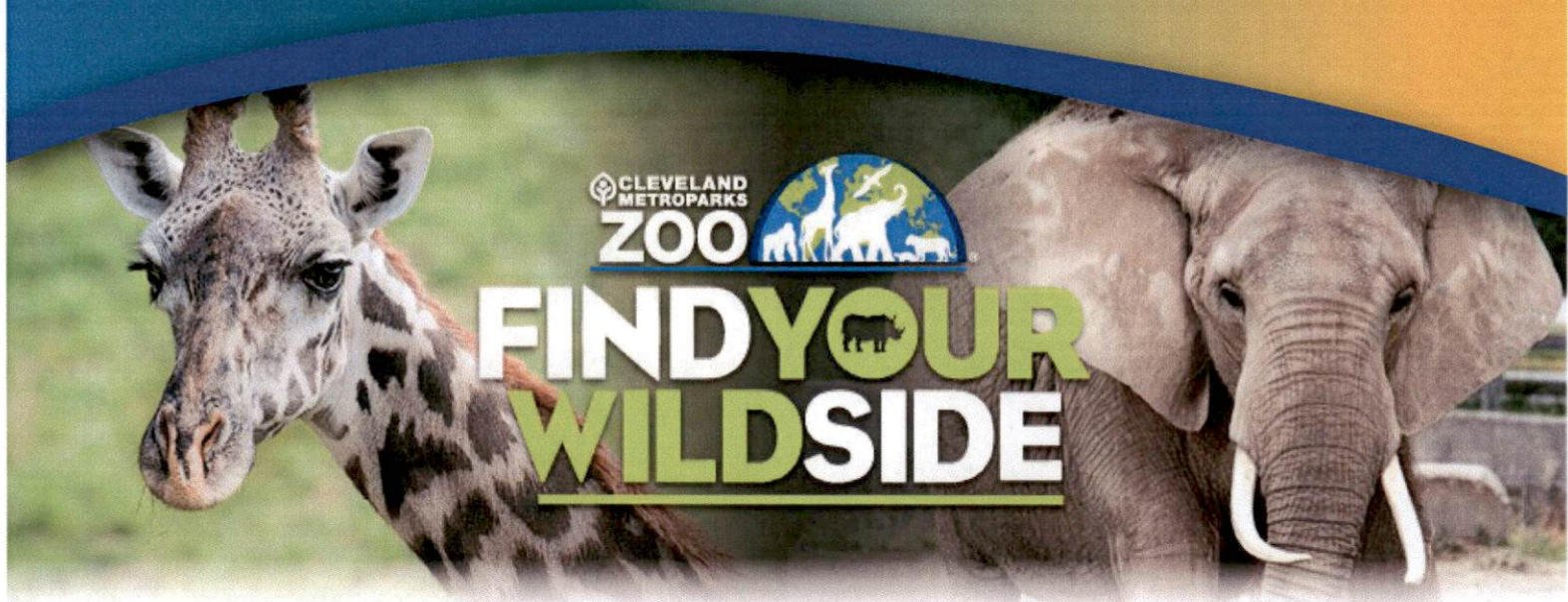

means there's no time to prune them all in one year. That means trees that were not pruned the previous year are the first to undergo pruning. Blueberry bushes, he said, are even more time consuming.

"If you don't prune, the trees and bushes are not going to get the needed sunlight," Bowman explains. "Watering plants can take up to 12 hours a day."

The endless hours of work are worth it as demonstrated by the continuous flow of families arriving in early July to pick blueberries. For many families, blueberry picking and apple picking are family traditions.

Hinckley resident Heidi Dyke arrived to pick blueberries with her daughter, Anna, this July. The duo was personally escorted by Bowman to the blueberry patch and Bowman, with his grandfatherly ways, made them feel at ease.



It's not all about apples at Hillside Orchard, as staffer Christi Hostetler demonstrates as she chops up fresh rhubarb in the farm's kitchen area.

"We come here every year," said Dyke. "As we pick, we eat some and most go in the bucket. I cook with them, freeze some and make a fantastic dessert of lemon curd

pie with blueberries on the bottom."

While a great deal of the fruit is offered fresh, a portion of the fruit crops go into making pies. The display case empties quickly with freshly baked pies bursting with the farm's fresh fruit. In the winter, the market offers homemade Christmas cookies. Serving customers, many of whom they greet by their first names, are Cindy Kent and Christi Hostetler.

Bowman says he never sees himself retiring, but noted that his youngest son, Scott, and his wife, Dawne, are helping to keep Hillside Orchard up and running into the future.

"As my wife said in the days before she passed, 'We don't say goodbye, we say see you later.'" Bowman said. "She added, 'If you give your life to Jesus, there are no 'goodbyes' just 'see you later.'" ∞

Jason Statham again does improbable battle with beasts from the deep in "Meg 2: The Trench."

'Meg 2' is in on the joke ... eventually

Perhaps it was the effects of a bright blue "sharkastic" cocktail, but about halfway through "Meg 2: The Trench," this self-serious sequel suddenly becomes funny.

The moment arrives when DJ (Page Kennedy), a mouthy techie who miraculously survived the first movie, tells Mac (Cliff Curtis) that this time, he has poison-tipped bullets, "just like in Jaws 2." Finally, we breathe a sigh of relief: The movie is in on the joke. Now we can laugh with "Meg 2: The Trench," rather than at it.

The moments that inspire laughter before this flip seem to be unintentionally humorous, such as when a character explains with grave intonation that Jonas (Jason Statham) actually can swim without a pressurized suit underwater at the bottom of a 25,000-foot trench, as long as he controls the air pressure in his sinuses — that's just Statham logic, and it's always a hook.

But it's not until we're out of the trench and up on the surface that director Ben Wheatley loosens up a lot, and has a little fun. But that first half is dire straits. Wheatley takes the helm from John Turkelhaus, who directed the delightfully ridiculous original giant shark movie "The Meg" in 2018, and works from a script by original writers Jon and Erich Hoeber and Dean Georgaris (both mov-

ies are based on books by Steve Alten). Wheatley and the writers gloss over the setup, and pay not even a passing interest in the new crew aboard the research vessel Mana One, where interchangeable supporting actors deliver sarcastic quips with a strangely flat affect.

When a few of those new crew meet their watery grave at the bottom of the titular trench, the only possible reaction is, "Who?"

The film's focus is on shark hero Jonas, and the teen in his care, Meiying (Shuya Sophia Cai), the daughter of scientist Suyin, who featured in the first film and is now mysteriously dead. Suyin has been replaced by her brother, Jiuming, played by Wu Jing, one of the biggest action stars in China. (The "Meg" films are U.S./China co-productions and cater to both audiences.)

The ebullient Jiuming is a daredevil marine biologist who has taken up his sister's mission to protect the oceans through underwater exploration, and

he's also taken a special interest in training and befriending Haig, the young megalodon living in the care of the Oceanic Institute. (As a quick reminder, megalodons, or "megs," are massive prehistoric sharks that live in a trench at the bottom of the ocean, contained by a thermocline barrier.)

As explorers are wont to do, they poke around down in the trench, and what do they find? Capitalism! Because there isn't an inch on this planet that some craven rich person won't figure out how to strip mine. While this trench sequence apes the underrated 2020 Kristen Stewart vehicle "Underwater," narratively, the secret mining operation serves as the plot wrinkle to throw our leads into danger, reveal a few characters as nefarious, and pierce the thermocline barrier, freeing the prehistoric apex predators.

The whole gang heads to "Fun Island," which is an apt moniker for the second half of this movie. On the beach, all manner of ancient sea creatures terrorize clueless tourists, as they are wont to do, and Wheatley lets it rip, taking the opportunity to riff on "Jaws" and other classic creature features like "Predator" and "Jurassic Park." He also nods to Benny Harte's "Deep Blue Sea," with Kennedy delivering 11 Cool-Jesque one-liners (as well as a howler of a shark-themed rap song for the credits).

The color palette is dark with pops of neon, giving it an early '90s look. Sprinkled throughout are video clips that nod to the cultural touchstones of the creators: snip-pets of "Ferris Bueller's Day Off," a salute to John Hughes, to whose vision of American high school the teen turtles cling, and instructional karate training videos, which is how Splinter (Jackie Chan) teaches his young turtle sons to defend themselves against the terrifying outside world.

The creators get back to basics with a story focusing on the question of fathers and sons, mutants existing within humanity and the universal desire for acceptance. Splinter, a New York City street rat, is already inured to human rejection when he adopts the four adorable turtles covered in radioactive ooze. He raises them in a loving environment, away from the hustle and bustle (and malice) of the city.

Their desire for community is a resonant message, but it's expressed in layered dialogue that feels like the way real teens talk to each other, and it's beautifully performed by the four actors voicing the turtles.

The film-makers manage to balance the contemporary feel of the writing and innovative visual style with their own nostalgia for childhood cultural touchstones, which makes "Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles: Mutant Mayhem" a fascinating and highly entertaining blend of old and new.

The themes are broad and universal but the writing is remarkable — the dialogue feels natural and authentic to the age group, and it's filled with modern slang and references to pop culture, rap songs, anime, comedy and more. Their desire for community is a resonant message, but it's expressed in layered dialogue that feels like the way real teens talk to each other, and it's beautifully performed by the four actors voicing the turtles.

Simple strategies to protect kids' vision over the long haul

Parents recognize there's no aspect of kids' health that can be taken for granted. Common colds can appear overnight, and injuries on the playground can occur in the blink of an eye. Such issues may be hard to see coming, but the risk for colds, playground injuries and other health-related conditions, including childhood vision problems, can be mitigated with various preventive measures.

Vision issues that affect children can lead to a host of unwanted outcomes, including physical injuries and decreased academic performance. Though kids may ultimately need vision problems to be corrected with the help of an eye doctor, the following are some steps parents can take to protect their children's vision over the long haul.

- **Schedule routine eye exams.** The American Academy of Ophthalmology notes that children's vision can be screened by various medical professionals, including eye doctors but also pediatricians, family physicians or other properly trained health care providers. The AAO recommends children at all age levels receive eye examinations. Newborns will need eye exams so doctors can check for various indicators of eye health, while a second eye exam conducted during a well visit before the child's first birthday can confirm

healthy eye alignment and movement. Exam intervals can be discussed with a physician as children age, but it's important that kids receive routine eye exams to confirm their vision is healthy and to identify any issues that could be compromising their vision.

- **Feed children a healthy diet.** The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommend a diet rich in fruits and vegetables, which have the vitamins and minerals necessary to maintain healthy vision.

- **Monitor screen time.** The CDC notes that excessive screen time can exacerbate uncorrected vision problems. Daily screen time limits can help protect kids' vision, and parents should ensure kids take frequent breaks when using digital devices. Frequent breaks from additional activities like reading, writing and drawing also can protect kids' vision.

- **Squeeze in time outdoors.** Access and exposure to nature pays a host of health-related dividends, including some linked to eye health. The CDC notes that going outdoors affords kids' eyes the opportunity to look at distant objects, which can provide a respite from the eye strain and fatigue that can develop when looking at screens or books.

- **Provide protective eyewear,** including sunglasses. Exposure to UV rays from the sun

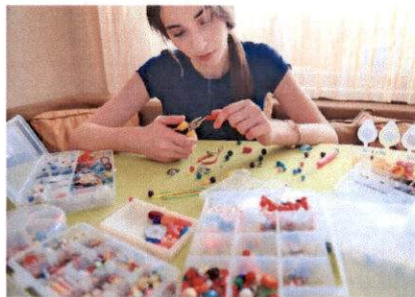


can harm children's eyes, so kids should wear sunglasses with 100 percent UV protection when spending time outside. The CDC also urges children to wear protective eyewear when engaging in activities such as sports

that can increase their risk for eye injury and vision loss.

Taking steps to protect long-term vision is a vital component of childhood preventive health care.

Know the Truth: 4 Myths about Developmental Disability

People with developmental disabilities are a part of the rich fabric of our community. We encourage you to help make our community a place where people with disabilities are welcomed and embraced as valued citizens. One way to help accomplish this is to learn what is fact and what is myth when it comes to developmental disabilities.

#1 Myth - People with developmental disabilities are always intellectually disadvantaged.

Fact - People with developmental disabilities have a wide range of intellectual and physical ability.

People with developmental disabilities may experience a wide range of situations related to physical abilities, intellectual abilities or both. For example, some developmental disabilities are seen as more physical, such as cerebral palsy. Others may be seen as intellectual, such as autism. While still others can be both physical and intellectual and related to genetic influences like Down Syndrome. Trends show that while developmental and intellectual disabilities are often related, they are most definitely not the same and one does not always mean the other. At the end of the day it does not matter, because people with developmental and intellectual disabilities have a wide range of abilities to share.

#2 Myth - Adults with developmental disabilities cannot live on their own.

Fact - Many adults with developmental disabilities live highly independent lives.

People with developmental disabilities, like most adults, wish to live as independently as they can. For some, total or near total independence is possible. For others, assistance in specific areas of their lives might be needed. The importance of helping individuals with developmental disabilities reach their highest level of independence should never be underestimated.

#3 Myth - Those with developmental disabilities are rarely employable.

Fact - Many individuals with developmental disabilities hold part or full-time jobs.

Sadly, a lingering assumption exists that people with devel-

opmental disabilities are either not employable, or should be considered charity cases for employment. These stereotypes have caused unnecessary high levels of unemployment among people with developmental disabilities. Many people with disabilities are capable of working, but have not received adequate training or simply been given a chance. The point is, many individuals with developmental disabilities are highly employable and actually enjoy working. It's usually just a matter of finding the right match!

#4 Myth - Most people with developmental disabilities desire pity and special attention.

Fact - Individuals with developmental disabilities want the same things we all want.

We are all human. The fact is that most people with developmental disabilities do not want or need special treatment one way or the other. They just want to be treated with dignity and respect, like we all do. We should not be surprised by this fact, once again, because people are people regardless of ability or situation.

People with developmental disabilities want to be part of our community. They want to live, learn, work and socialize just like every other person. Knowing the best ways to help them feel welcome is important for all of us. 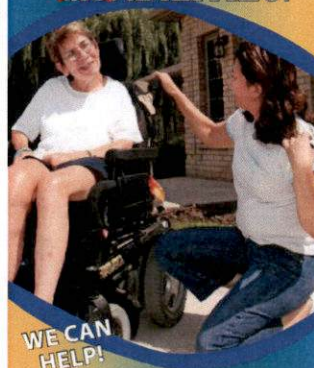

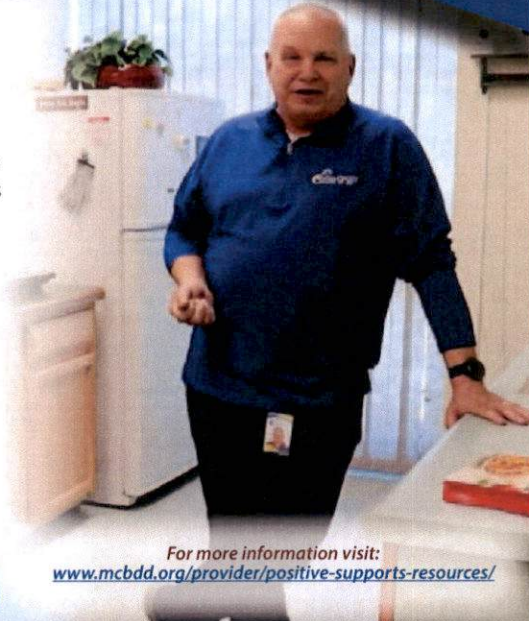

schools. There was so much focus on instruction and academics and it was very exciting.”

Sable said that before the students’ first day, the staff held a meeting and this school year’s focus was revealed: Evolving for the Future through a Lens of Hope.

“We have a focus each school year and it is something we highlight everywhere including the classrooms, the buses, the kitchens, and everywhere else in the district,” he said. “The focus is meant to coincide with our strategic plan and Portrait of a Bee.”

Sable said this focus is a nod to the work the district has been doing over the last 10 years of evolving education to make sure they are preparing students for the world outside of school.

“No longer are you seeing the standard

desks in a row with teachers teaching from the front of the room,” he said. “We believe it takes a lot more than delivery of content to make students prepared for success and we are embracing the continuation of this evolving.”

Sable said the district also focuses on empowering and supporting their employees to do what is best and trust them as professionals within the classroom.

“Another message we shared with staff is that while test scores and state report card is important, that is not our main focus,” he said. “Our main focus is providing the best instructional strategies in our classrooms and if we do that the state report card and high test scores will naturally come.”

Also during the meeting City Engineer Patrick Patton reminded the public that while West Smith Road has been completely open for the last few weeks, it will soon be closed to through traffic again.


"It was a requirement to have the road open for a two week period when the fair was happening, but work on the project is not done so that work will resume either later this week or next week," he said. "We will put out a notification when that is happening. Once the work starts, the road will be open to local traffic only."

Police Chief Ed Kinney also took the time to remind motorists that school is back in session.


"So everyone needs to be cautious of students walking to and from school and to also keep an eye out for buses," he said.

Kinney added that when a bus is stopped with its red lights flashing, motorists must stop and are not allowed to go around the bus.

"If you go around the bus, you are going to get a citation and that is a mandatory court appearance," he said. "We don't want anyone to get hurt and we don't want to have to give citations."

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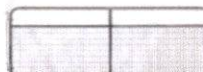

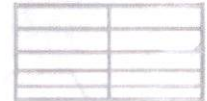

How did you start in the field? I started working as a DSP after a talk with my loving and caring Mother (who is also a DSP).

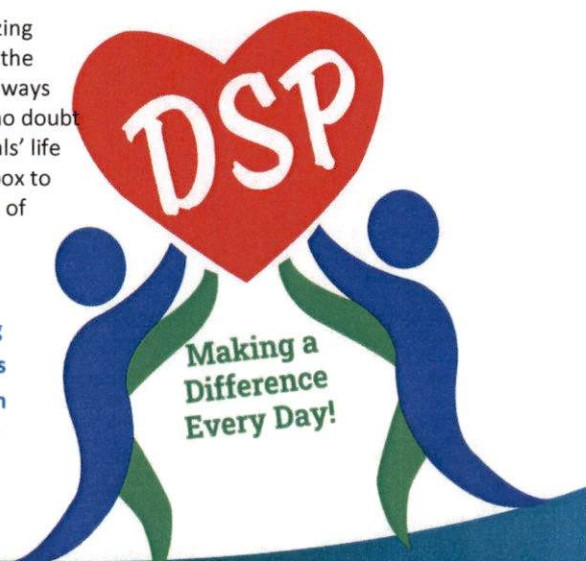

Let's face it. Coming up with a dinner solution every night of the week can be daunting – not only for those who lead busy lives, but for those who have difficulty managing their way in the kitchen.

For those who live in Hinckley Township, however, the task just got a little easier thanks to the kitchen helpers at Our Saviour Lutheran Church.

Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, approximately a dozen or so volunteers have been gathering at the church kitchen where they spend a day slicing, dicing and preparing a free meal that

"It started out with us serving 20 or 30 sit-down meals at the church every month," said McCaudy. "When the pandemic came, we decided to do a takeout meal instead and we are now up to [preparing] about 84 meals every month."

On cooking day, volunteers from the church are spread out across the large kitchen and everyone seems to know just what needs to be done.

"We are a tight-knit group," said McCaudy. "Our church is our family and the monthly meal is something we can provide for those who could use a good, home-cooked meal."

During the month of May, the menu featured a gourmet burger, deviled egg, Portillo's chopped salad and a homemade sandwich cookie, McCaudy said. As she

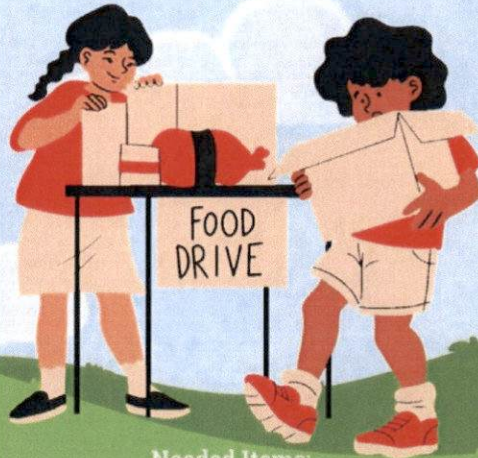

"Which allows our staff
to offer seniors in the com-

munity additional services,
maybe people we haven't met
before," Toth said.

After the initial assessment,
MCOOA sends the completed
paperwork over to Habitat for

Humanity to be added to a list
for completion.

Habitat for Humanity Executive
Director Tom O'Connell said that quickly after the Aging in Place program
began, they received four
requests from the Office for
Older Adults.

As of Tuesday morning,
O'Connell said the program
has received 16 requests. Of
the requests, five have been
underway.

"These requests have
included leaky faucets, dry-
wall repair, gutter repairs,
installing many grab bars,
repairing hand railings, light
fixtures," he said.

Toth said that responses
from the residents to the program
have been very positive,
stating that MCOOA has
heard from people regarding

a range of repairs.

Her hope for the program
is to be able to aid seniors
within the Medina County
community get small repairs
done through the Aging in
Place program or give them

homeowners," O'Connell
said. "That's our plan to keep

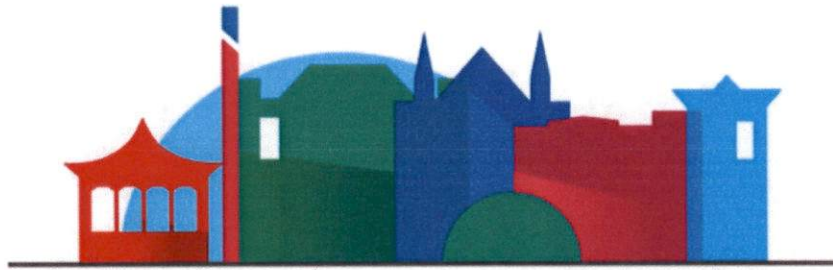

Victims of 9/11 remembered

MEDINA — Firefighters, first responders, pilots, flight attendants, city officials and community members gathered at Medina 9/11 Memorial Park on Monday morning to remember the lives lost 22 years ago.

More than 40 people gathered at the 9/11 Memorial for a ceremony hosted by Medina Sunrise Rotary, in partnership with the city of Medina.

During the ceremony, Medina Mayor Dennis Hanwell served as the master of ceremonies and also spoke on the day.

Hanwell said that after the attacks occurred 22 years ago,

many made a commitment to remembering what happened and remembering those who died.

"Medina does not forget, and we will hold this day in reverence forever," he said.

For a number of years, the former Medina Evening Rotary Club worked to create a concept for the 9/11 Memorial. In 2011, the Rotary Club was awarded the 1.5-ton beam that came from the World Trade Center's north tower.

After receiving the beam, the Rotary Club and city worked to find the best location for a memorial, deciding on next door to Medina Fire Station No. 1, 300 W. Reagan Parkway.

The Medina 9/11 Memorial

was dedicated in 2018, with a focus on United Airlines Flight 93.

"(Rotary member Bill) Cohen believed that Medina had a direct connection to 9/11 because United Airlines Flight 93, the plane that passengers commandeered and forced down in Shanksville, Pennsylvania, flew over Medina County on that day," Hanwell said.

Hanwell said that now, the memorial stands on hallowed ground, dedicated to the memory of those who died on 9/11 and the first responders who were willing to sacrifice their lives to save others.

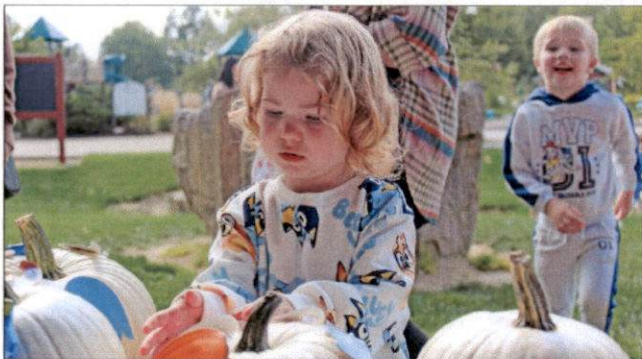

New organization coming to Lodi to help cemeteries

LODI — A group of Lodi residents is banding together to help take care of the many historical cemeteries in the Lodi area.

Lodi Harriaville Historical Society President Letha Mapes held a special meeting with Lodi residents in the hopes of creating a 501(c)(3) named

Friends of the Cemeteries Organization. Mapes said the idea stems from four local cemeteries struggling to be maintained and looking professional.

"For years it has been in disarray," Mapes said. "They've gone through a lot of changes because it was a foundation at one time. Like everything else, some elderly people were taking care of it, and it wasn't taken care of well. So there have always been a lot

of complaints through the years."

Some of the participants of the meeting echoed the disappointment of the appearance of the cemeteries. Most mentioned gravestones being hit and marked by lawnmowers, as well as military medallions that have been knocked over or damaged by weather.

"My daughter was buried there, and my parents are buried there, and

it just wasn't looking good," Mapes said. "Obviously, the town is short of money and short of people too, so it's not necessarily them. But it is just something that needs to be done."

The organization will look after the Albert-Munson Cemetery, Old Lodi Cemetery, Voorhees Cemetery, and Woodlawn Cemetery. Mapes said that the goal of the organization is to help cover the cost of some of the expenses

of the cemetery maintenance.

Mapes has drafted a committee of individuals who were present at the first meeting, including:

"We do have an attorney, Marty Kerr. He said that he would help us get the 501(c)(3) settled," Mapes said. "If we get the money in, we have to be a non-profit, and we have to go through all of those steps. We'll then call a meeting, and then go

"I think we're getting the word out to more and more people every time," she said. "We always have people asking when the next one is, so I think they've been really successful."

Palasik, alongside fellow MCBDD speech language pathologist Diana Wachsbarger, ran the event. Palasik said they look for activities that are toddler friendly and easy to clean up afterward.

"We're just looking for things that are going to be interesting to toddlers," Palasik said. "It's geared more toward that one and two-year-old age where they're interested in sensory things. They're interested in touching and feeling and playing."

Although the playgroup is hosted by the MCBDD, all toddlers are welcome, regardless if the child has a disability or not, Wachsbarger said

it is important to have an accessible event for all toddlers because children learn best through play.

"Making activities that are adaptable to all kinds of ways that kids play is something that we try to do here," she said. "We notice a family coming in, and we will facilitate that play with them and adapt things as needed."

MCBDD plans to bring the program back next year, but there are no specific dates yet, Palasik said. They are considering doing the playgroups quarterly and hosting some of them indoors next year in order to increase the frequency of events, but nothing is finalized yet.

"We're trying to do them semi-regularly, so that people can be aware and know when they're going to come up," she said. "We plan to continue to do them."

Cleveland museum hosting annual Chalk Festival

The history of chalk art dates back to a 16th-century Italian Renaissance tradition in which beggars after copying paintings of the Madonna by Raphael displayed their modern expression works on the plazas outside of cathedrals.

In Northeast Ohio that tradition is celebrated at the Cleveland Museum of Art (CMA) annual Chalk Festival, which this year takes place today and Sunday around the venue's south plaza and walkways through the Fine Arts Garden and down to Wade Lagoon.

"It's a relaxing way to spend time with their friends and family," CMA's

Community Arts Director Stefanie Taub said. "You can just stroll around, look at people's artwork and watch the artists creating."

"It's also an easy access to get there because street parking is free on the weekends. The best part is you can go into the museum and enjoy the galleries and exhibitions. The weekend is just a beautiful package of fun and relaxation."

The Chalk Festival is free to visitors wishing to enjoy the artists' work and listen to live music provided by Ropa Vieja in the garden. However, squares for drawing and boxes of chalk (supplies limited) are available for \$10 and \$20 with on-site, day-of registration.

There will also be younger artists commissioned by CMA.

"We've had students in the past but it's been quite a while," she said. "This year we're having two student groups from the Cleveland Institute of Art. They're juniors. Three are working together on a big masterpiece and two are working together on a second masterpiece."

"So in addition to our regular featured artists — professional artists doing very large-scale drawings over the course of two days — we have these two student groups. We're very excited about that partnership."

Taub said the students — just like the general public — will experience

the unique qualities of the chalk art form.

"For someone who is intimidated by the process, they can just experiment with colors, shapes, blending and just having fun doing whatever they want," she said. "It's an easy way to participate without too much intimidation."

"And as you grow a little more confident in it, you can see the pastels are really forgiving and really easy to work with."

"It's actually quite easy to work with the pastels and create something really cool. It's a great entryway into drawing — working with pastels and just having fun."

EMERSON STRING QUARTET

NEO native reflects on stormy Oberlin performance

Emerson String Quartet's Philip Setzer will forever associate Finney Chapel with booming thunder, crashing lightning and a life-changing message delivered from the heavens.

It was more than 50 years ago that the fate of the world-renowned violinist and Northeast Ohio native was cemented one stormy night in Oberlin.

"It was a special, very important turning point in my life," said 1969 Brush High School graduate Setzer, calling from a tour stop on the Duke University campus in Durham, North Carolina.

"My parents, who both played in the Cleveland Orchestra for many years, studied with Oscar Shumsky at the Peabody Institute. Over the years, when he came to town to play a recital or something, I'd always go hear him."

The performance in question took place during Setzer's senior year of high school when he was deciding between studying with Shumsky, then at New York City's Juilliard School, or Indiana University's Josef Gingold.

"Shumsky was playing a recital, all unaccompanied violin and viola at Oberlin," he said. "My parents took me. In the middle of the performance, there was this huge thunder and lightning

storm.

"I'm sitting there listening to this great violinist play probably certainly one of the greatest pieces of music ever in that gorgeous Finney Chapel. I'm thinking, OK, this is a sign I should go to Juilliard and study with Shumsky, which is what I did."

It would be at the Johns Hopkins University campus that Setzer would meet violinist Eugene Drucker and eventually create the premier chamber music ensemble and Grammy Award-winning Emerson String Quartet.

"So Finney Chapel on that Sunday afternoon was a real turning point in my life for a lot of reasons," he said.

Even though Setzer hasn't called Northeast Ohio home for decades, he still has connections and fond ties to the area.

Currently he serves as visiting faculty of the Cleveland Institute of Music.

"It's my hometown," he said. "I grew up going to Severance Hall every week, hearing that great orchestra and seeing my parents down there. It still tugs at me every time I get off the plane."

"I kind of expect my parents to

greet me, and they've been gone a long time now. So Cleveland was like my first home and now it's my second home."

As for the Emerson String Quartet — Setzer (violin), Drucker, Lawrence Dutton (viola) and Paul Watkins (cello) — after nearly five decades of performing and recording, the ensemble has announced its end is near with its final tour.

This includes a return to Oberlin College on Friday for their final performance on Finney Chapel's stage.

In an apropos fashion, the quartet will be performing the same piece — Beethoven's String Quartet No. 13 in B-flat Major, Op. 135 — it played when making its Lorain County debut in 1985 at the iconic venue.

One of the composer's last works, the monumental six-movement

includes the original last movement the Grosse Fuge.

The upcoming program also features Felix Mendelssohn's first mature string quartet No. 2 in A Minor, Op. 13 and Sarah Kirkland Snider's "Drink the Wild Aye."

The entire performance is expected to be a night celebrating themes of emotional nostalgia, tragedy and triumph.

Oberlin violin professor Sibyll Bernhardsson in a press release called the Emerson String Quartet the most influential chamber group of the last 40 years.

Such high praise isn't lost on Setzer. "Of course, it's a great honor to be spoken about that way," he said. "All I can think about is that we're just continuing a great tradition that was handed to us by the groups that came before us, by the musicians we studied with and inspired us. It gives me great joy when young music students say, 'I listened to all of your recordings.'"

"That's also another reason why we're stopping to perform now because we want to spend even more time to work with young groups. It's really so important — not just what we've done but what the people before us did to enable what we've done to help enable the future."

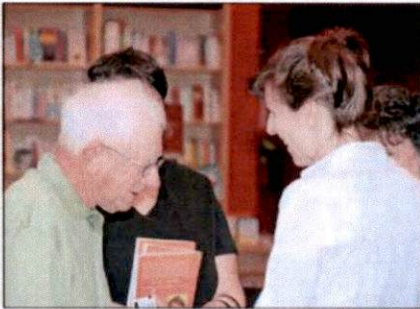

tending we were playing along with the soundtrack they had going. That was easy as a flute player but hard for the trombones. They decided to move their slides to the beat as if they were playing the school fight song."

Vogl credits her MHS English teachers, Carol Lenk and Dorothy Elrick, for giving her a start in writing.

"They helped me recognize excellence in writing and to demand the same of my own work. And, importantly, they taught me the value of completing something — an essay, a scene, or a chapter."

After graduating from MHS, Vogl continued her education at Cornell University and then at University of Michigan Law School.

She married, practiced law for five years, and

stepped back to care for her two daughters. She has lived in Plymouth Minnesota since 1999. After writing her memoir she began a new career in writing, editing, and critiquing, and earned an MFA in Creative Writing from Hamline University.

Vogl teaches fiction and memoir at the nationally acclaimed Loft Literary Center in Minneapolis.

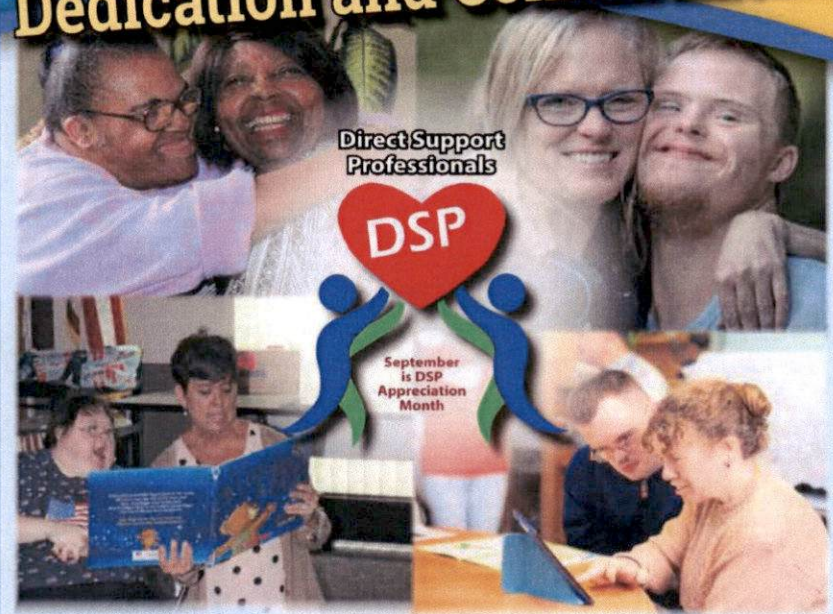
She tells students who want to write memoirs, "Maybe it's true that all the stories have already been written, but you're the only one who has your voice and can tell the story you have to tell."

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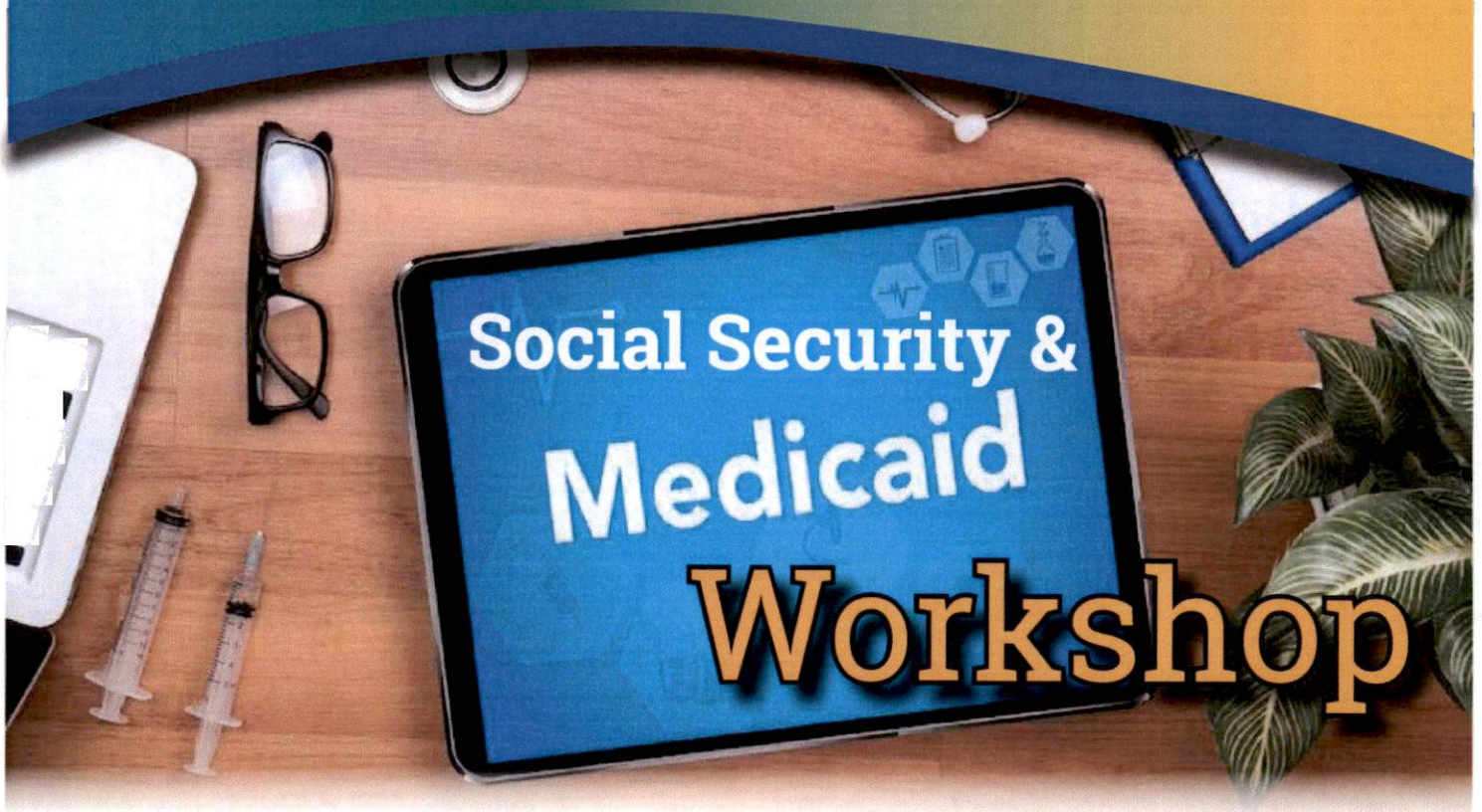

8 Welcoming ways to meet a person with an intellectual disability

There are around 6.5 million people with intellectual disabilities in the United States. Intellectual disability generally appears at birth, and it is typically first seen as learning difficulties and delayed development when compared to the average population. When you first meet a person with an intellectual disability, you may not know how to interact with them. You may feel uncomfortable because you do not always know how to approach them, or help them when needed. Whether you are a business professional who wants to know how to welcome a person with an intellectual disability into your establishment or a curious citizen who wants advice in order to more easily communicate with a neighbor with an intellectual disability, try these tips.

1. SMILE!

There is nothing more welcoming than a sincere smile to put everyone at ease when you start a conversation.

2. STAY NATURAL

When facing a person with an intellectual disability, the best thing to do is to address them the same way you would anyone. Use a warm tone, and do not express any pity.



3. DO NOT INFANTILIZE YOUR CONVERSATION PARTNER

Treat the person the same way you would any other person of their age. Do not treat them as a child. Remain respectful in all circumstances, even if some behavior can seem childish to you.

4. BE PATIENT

Take your time to truly listen to the person in front of you and adopt a reassuring attitude. Let the person speak and react at their own pace. Also, be patient when you inform or guide a person with an intellectual disability.

5. USE SIMPLE AND CLEAR LANGUAGE

Use language without technical and specialized terms or unnecessary details to help you get your message across in the most effective way.

6. ADD OTHER METHODS TO YOUR COMMUNICATION

A written text, an image or even body language can be useful when the person in front of you has trouble understanding you or the information you are trying to share.

7. OFFER TO HELP

You can always offer to help, but don't get offended if the answer is "no". A person with an intellectual disability can be very independent based on the situation and their capabilities, so it's best not to impose your help even though you have good intentions.

8. DO NOT TAKE OFFENSE

Some behaviors or attitudes can seem strange to you but there's no need to take offense. Sometimes these behaviors are just part of who they are.

Have questions or need additional help or resources? The Medina County Board of Developmental Disabilities is the community resource responsible for connecting, coordinating, and funding services for individuals of all ages with intellectual and developmental disabilities. We help with everything from early intervention and education opportunities for children to employment and community inclusive living for adults.
