I. <u>Call to Order</u>

The MCBDD Regular Board Meeting was called to order by Board President Andy Olah at 5:06 p.m. Other Board Members present included the following: Dave Hartman, Kelly Smith, Debbie Bokmuller, and Mark Gryskiewicz. Lisa Dreaden and Adina Kolar were excused.

II. General Session

Mr. Olah stated that there is a revised Agenda that was distributed to the Board. He also stated that Ms. Dreaden, Board Secretary, is not in attendance and asked for a volunteer to take Minutes. Mr. Hartman volunteered.

Ms. Maleckar reviewed the 2024 Annual Report which included, but was not limited to, data in the following areas:

Mr. Harman stated he would like to see better signage for the Mobile Changing Unit. Ms. Hetkey will look into this. Mr. Gryskiewicz asked if the number of providers we work with is up or down from last year. Ms. Maleckar stated it is up. Ms. Bokmuller stated it would be an interesting data point to know how many independent providers are a provider for a family member. Ms. Maleckar stated we will look into this. Ms. Smith asked if we know what attributed to the increase in the number of people served. Ms. Maleckar stated some have moved here from other counties and with the recent addition of more qualifying diagnoses for EI, that number has steadily increased. Ms. Maleckar stated that she will share the information in this report at meetings she attends at other county agencies and council meetings, etc.

2. ARPA Wrap Up Report

Ms. Maleckar stated that ARPA funds are DODD and State funds. Ms. Maleckar reviewed the ARPA Grant Report which included information regarding the four areas of funds use:

- Supported Connections (\$49,500)
- Community Experiences (\$11,222)
- Universal Changing Tables (\$58,759)
- Accessible Communities (\$10,100)

Ms. Smith asked if we will get these grant funds again. Ms. Maleckar stated that we will not; this was a one-time grant. Ms. Maleckar stated that due to the successful outcomes, we will continue to fund some programs with local funds.

G. New Business

 - Revenue: Ms. Bates gave a brief overview of the report for the new Board Members.

 - Other Revenue School lunch accounts and GovDeals.
 - Federal Grants National School Lunch Program.
 - State Grants Reduced lunch refund of \$1.60.
 - Refunds Provider returned unused DODD ARPA grant funds. This was not known at budgeting time and will cause us to exceed the revenue budget for refunds in 2025.
 - Donations \$15.00 cash found in Community Supports Dept. program file; deposited to Donated Funds.
 - Expenditures: Ms. Bates gave a brief overview of the report for the new Board Members.
 - o Dental Two months, Jan/Feb.
 - Fees Second quarter FY25 Admin Fees, \$90,832.07.
 - Liability Insurance/Violence 5% increase for liability (industry standard), 0% increase for violence, \$345.
 - Vehicle Insurance 5% increase (industry standard), \$10,108.
 - Travel/Training \$4,934.00 for Operating Mileage, \$5,415.00 for Training (including OACB Conference).
 - Contract Services \$94,290.00 (prior year expense).

- Contract Projects \$321,590.00 (prior year expense). \$299,640.00 for CAP housing project. \$17,500.00 DODD ARPA expense for NMT. \$4,450.00 for provider support programs.
- Other Expenses Annual Membership Dues for OACB (\$49,230.00), OPRA (\$3,000.00), and other professional dues.
- Equipment \$1,599.00 for wall padding on school side.
- Match Third quarter FY25 (\$1.8M) and five individuals in a developmental center (\$38K).
- Prior year expense total \$479,926.00, 13% of total expenses for January 2025.
- General Reserve amount is about \$40,000.00 under budgeted amount; will not be revising the budgeted amount. General Reserve is based on 40% of prior year expenditures. This is projected at budget time and recalculated once the books close for the year.
- Capital Reserve budgeted amount is from initial cash transfer (when the rule went into effect) less each year's capital improvement budget. Total capital funds cannot exceed 25% of replacement value.
- Ms. Maleckar reviewed the process for utilizing CAP Housing funds.

- ➢ Monthly Cash Flow
 - \$3.3M use of Fund Balance; we have projected that deficit spending will begin in 2025.

 - Ms. Maleckar stated that there are Performance Outcomes both related to the Strategic Plan and not related to the Strategic Plan. She stated the Board will receive a quarterly report regarding the status of these outcomes.

III. <u>Open Forum</u>

Wayne Carroll: Mr. Carroll gave a brief statement of appreciation regarding his time as an MCBDD Board Member. He stated he is concerned about the "Science of Reading," a system picked by the state of Ohio, and whether it allows for individualization of individuals with disabilities, rather than using data based on averages. Mr. Lambdin stated that this is just one tool in the toolbox of teachers. The state wants to use research-based methods and we want to ensure our teachers have all the tools they need to assist the students in reaching their IEP goals. Mr.

Lambdin stated the teachers do a great job of communicating with parents and the home school districts in regard to the progress of the students' IEPs goals and other needs.

Mr. Hartman asked if we have a plan in regard to the possible cuts in state programs that may affect individuals with disabilities. Ms. Maleckar stated that we, along with OACB, are working with both state and federal legislators regarding this and that there are a lot of unknowns at this point.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

- March is Developmental Differences Awareness Month and was promoted countywide, with articles in local news and social media.
- The week of 3/17-21 was celebrated as Disability Inclusion Week and we celebrated "Coloring the County Orange for Inclusion." Providers also received materials to help during the week including posters, buttons, etc.
 - **Monday COLOR WAR:** We held an orange color war between MCBDD departments starting on Monday and going throughout the week.
 - **Tuesday ORANGE OUT and BUTTON BONANZA**: Everyone was invited to wear orange to show support as the County Commissioners made a proclamation for DD Awareness Month. We passed out buttons to celebrate inclusion.
 - Wednesday LET'S GET SOCIAL: We shared inclusive opportunities on agency social media channels. #IncludeMe

EARLY INTERVENTION (EI)

- February was a very busy month for Medina County Early Intervention. This month we processed 39 new referrals making it the most referrals in a month this fiscal year. Medina County received 100% compliance on the state mandated submission of the LEA report.
- The EI Coordinator completed and submitted both the General Oversight Report to the Family First Council and the Mid-Year Grant Report to the state. The EI team completed a FFC outreach project assembling and distributing 30 baskets to licensed daycares in the county to encourage an increase in referrals from this referral source.







Enhancing partnerships and outreach that support inclusion, awareness and engagement in the community.

1. Increase community employment through community partnerships throughout the county.

2. Use community partners to increase inclusion and accessibility throughout the county.

3. Engage community partners through outreach and education.

- Business and community members have been identified and contacted. Quarterly meetings have been scheduled and will start in March.
- 1b. A list of DODD and OOD providers has been developed. They were contacted and their availability to receive new referrals was confirmed.
- Reports focused on the uses of career planning and Independent Employment Services (IES) are being run and analyzed. Materials to increase business engagement will be developed based on results.
- 2a. The committee to develop an environmental accessibility and inclusion plan has been developed and meetings have started.
- 2b. Multiple organizations, including recreation centers, schools, and a church, have been contacted to discover opportunities for greater inclusion. Additional opportunities will continue to be investigated.
- 2c. Three child care agencies have been contacted about increasing inclusion efforts and have asked to schedule meetings in the spring.
- 2d. Information regarding communication plans has been obtained for three school districts. Currently, we are waiting for information from other school districts. Information will be requested again.
- 3a. In collaboration with Alternative Paths, MCBDD provided disability awareness training for police officers from various departments throughout the county on Tuesday, March 18.
- 3b. County schools have been contacted and a list of after-school programs is being compiled.
- 3c. We are currently analyzing engagement data from social media, website, emarketing, and the Medina County Poll in order to determine key groups to target with future outreach and education efforts.

February was a very busy month for Medina County Early Intervention. This month we processed 39 new referrals

39

making it the most referrals in a month this fiscal year. Medina County received 100% compliance on the state mandated submission of the LEA report. EI Coordinator completed and submitted both the General Oversight Report to the Family First Council and the Mid-Year Grant Report to the state. The EI team completed a FFC outreach project assembling and distributing 30 baskets to licensed daycares in the county to encourage an increase in referrals from this referral source. EI Coordinator also presented Medina County Early Intervention information to Health Department providers and WIC providers for continued efforts in encouraging appropriate referrals from our Medina County partners.

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10 Things People with Developmental Disabilities Want You to Know

Medina County board of developmental disabilities

March is Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month, a time when we celebrate the importance of inclusion of people with developmental disabilities in all areas of our community. A time to recognize their abilities and, more importantly, what we all can do to make our community a place where people with disabilities are welcomed and embraced as valued citizens.



So, what do people with developmental disabilities want others in their community to know?

[1]

Treat me as you would your peers. Do not speak down to me. I love a good joke, tease, or challenge just like you.

[2]

Don't speak loudly when you talk to me. Speaking more loudly won't make me understand you better. While people with developmental disabilities have varying degrees of abilities, we are not all necessarily hard of hearing. When speaking to us use clear, simplified language and speak a little slower, not louder.

[3]

Setting expectations helps us fit in. Knowing ahead of time what will happen in a situation helps us prepare. We are more at ease when you describe what you will be doing now, and perhaps the next one or two steps that will follow.

[4]

Please do not call me a kid. People with developmental disabilities range from ages 0-100.

Draw boundaries. Do not allow me to get away with bad behavior-just as you wouldn't allow someone without a developmental disability to behave badly.

[5]

[6]

Ask me about my thoughts and allow me the time to answer. Sometimes it may take me longer, but please do not speak for me or put words in my mouth. Please be patience so I can express myself in different situations.

[7]

Please ask if you can help me before acting. Many people just assume I need help, when in reality I am able to do many things myself, again it may just take a little longer. I will ask for help if and when I need it.

[8]

Sometimes I ask a lot of questions. People with developmental disabilities can be very curious about what you are doing and also just about

you. If my questions get too invasive, it's okay to say, "I'm not comfortable with answering that."

[9]

Have fun and enjoy our time together. Be prepared for bluntness as many of us are very honest. Sometimes we may say things that strike a nerve, it's just something we do.

[10]

We are typically enthusiastic and upbeat. We enjoy life. If it becomes overwhelming, it's also okay to ask for a break.



■ In 1794, Eli Whitney received a patent for his cotton gin, an invention that revolutionized the American cotton industry.

■ In 1964, a jury in Dallas found Jack Ruby guilty of murdering Lee Harvey Oswald, the accused assassin of President John F. Kennedy, and sentenced Ruby to death. (Both the conviction and death sentence were overturned, but Ruby died before he could be retried.) ■ In 1967, the body of President John F. Kennedy was moved from a temporary grave to a permanent memorial site at Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia. ■ In 1973, future U.S. senator and presidential candidate John McCain was released from North Vietnamese captivity after being held as a prisoner of war for over five vears ■ In 1980, a LOT Polish

Airlines jet crashed while attempting to land in Warsaw, killing all 87 people aboard, including 22 athletes and staff members of the U.S. boxing team.

■ In 2015, Robert Durst, a wealthy eccentric linked to two killings and his wife's disappearance, was arrested by the FBI in New Orleans on a murder warrant a day before HBO aired the final episode of a serial documentary about his life. (Durst would be convicted in the shooting death of his friend, Susan Berman; he died in January 2022 while serving a life sentence in California.)

Cuyahoga's population loss was among the worst in the nation. The report estimated Cuyahoga had 1,240,594 residents last year — 24,181 fewer than in 2020. Only nine of the nation's more than 3,100 counties saw bigger drops.

Most of the state's rural counties also lost population. The exceptions are mainly along the Interstate 71 corridor that runs from Cleveland

through Columbus to Cincinnati or border large urban counties that lost population. (See attached map.)

The report estimated Ohio's total population at 11,883,304 – an increase of about 83,800 since the 2020 Census. That meager 0.7 percent increase in population ranks the Buckeye State 40th among the 43 states that showed growth.

The seven states that reported declines are California (-0.3 percent), Mississippi (-0.6 percent), Hawaii (-0.6 percent), Illinois (-0.9

percent), Louisiana (-1.3 percent), West Virginia (-1.3 percent) and New York (-1.7 percent).

A major factor slowing Ohio's growth is the growing gap between births and deaths. In the last four years, the state saw 43,641 more deaths than births. Only Florida and Pennsylvania had a larger difference between deaths and births.

Ohio also saw a net loss of 38,018 residents who moved to other states. But that loss was more than offset by the 164,274 people who immigrated to Ohio from other nations.

Deaths outnumbered births in all but 11 Ohio counties. Lorain County saw 2,255 more deaths than births in the last four years; Medina County had 993 more deaths.

But those losses and more were made up by new residents coming from other counties, states and overseas.

Lorain County added 9,045 residents from other areas of the nation and 2,036 immigrants from other countries. Medina County gained 2,241 people from within the U.S. and 883 immigrants.



County invests \$35 million in ARPA funds to strengthen infrastructure, public health, economic recovery

On March 11, 2021, the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) was signed into law, providing \$1.9 trillion in economic stimulus to support recovery efforts across the United States. As part of this nationwide initiative, Medina County was allocated just under \$35 million to address local needs and chaleican Rescue pan

lenges resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Medina County Commissioners were given the responsibility to allocate and invest these funds in a manner that would benefit the community while adhering to federal guidelines. The U.S. Department of Treasury identified five major categories for the allowable use of these funds:

1. Supporting Public Health Response Enhancing public health initiatives, including COVID-19 mitigation efforts, vaccination programs, medical services, and behavioral health resources.

2. Addressing Negative Economic Impacts - Assisting businesses, households, and nonprofits affected by the pandemic through grants, job training programs, and financial aid.

3. Replacing Public Sector Revenue Loss - Ensuring continuity of government services that may have been impacted by revenue shortfalls due to the pandemic.

4. Providing Premium Pay for Essential Workers – Offering additional compensation for frontline workers who provided essential services during the public health emergency.

5. Water, Sewer, and Broadband Infrastructure – Investing in long-term improvements to public utilities, including clean water initiatives, sewage system upgrades, and expanded broadband access for underserved areas.

The funds were designated to cover costs incurred between March 3, 2021 and December 24, 2024. By December 31, 2024, all funds had to be allocated and obligated to specific projects or initia-

Continued from page 1 • tives. Furthermore, all expenditures related to these obligations, including the completion of funded projects, must be finalized by December 31, 2026.

The ARPA funds provided Medina County with a unique opportunity to address urgent community needs while investing in long-term improvements. The allocation of these funds played a crucial role in ensuring economic stability, enhancing public services, and strengthening the county's infrastructure for future growth.

First and foremost, because of the timeliness, the commissioners provided a \$125,000 subgrant to the Medina County Fair Board to assist with COVID-necessary expenses for equipment, improvements, and contract services to support the public health response for the 2021 Medina County Fair.




